

El Ranchito Defeats Fort Sheridan Team Sunday, Score 6 to 5

The El Ranchito polo team composed of A. B. Wharton, Alfred House, Cecil Childers, and Arthur Naylor, defeated the Fort Sheridan team last Sunday afternoon at the Fort, 6-5, after giving the Fort Sheridan quartet a two-goal handicap. Mr. Childers, with three goals to his credit, was high-point man in the six chukker contest.

Two of the regular members of the Fort Sheridan team were playing at Onwentsia Thursday afternoon against the West team which will take part in the "World Series of Polo" at the Lake Forest club on two days next week, Sunday and Wednesday. So the Fort Sheridan lineup was modified somewhat, and was as follows: Lt. G. S. Smith, Richard Simmons, Prentice Porter, and Lt. L. G. Smith.

This was the last of a three-game series between the two teams, Fort Sheridan having won the first and El Ranchito the second, both by close scores. The El Ranchito team is from Arlington, Tex.

There will be no game at Fort Sheridan next Sunday afternoon, on account of the game at Onwentsia, and if a third game is necessary at Onwentsia, to determine "the world's champions" of polo, it will be played the following Sunday, on which day there will be no game at Fort Sheridan.

Tax Collections Are Good In Lake County

Tax collections in Lake County are better this year, according to County Treasurer Jay B. Morse.

The county had collected close to 75 per cent of the tax money due, Mr. Morse stated last Saturday. Within the next 60 days he hopes to collect another 60 per cent of the balance due, and believes this possible on the basis of present returns.

The money that had been cleared through the cages of the treasurer's office amounted to \$3,636,815.44 at 5 o'clock Saturday night. That figure did not include about \$200,000 in checks. The total amount of taxes to be collected this year amounts to \$5,255,366.73.

The collection is far better than last year, and compares with the boom years when close to 95 per cent of the taxes were paid.

Dick Martin Loses His District Championship

Dick Martin, of Highland Park, playing in the district amateur golf championship matches last week as a representative of Briegate Golf Club, lost his last year's title in the final match on Thursday to George Dawson, of Glen Oak, 1 up in the 36-hole match. The new champion is a Glen Oak player.

Mr. Martin, who is golf coach at the University of Illinois, where he recently graduated from law school, is a graduate of Deerfield-Shields High School. In his match with the new district champion last Thursday, he shot two 4's for an 80 in the afternoon round, to Mr. Dawson's 35-38-73, but in the morning he defeated the champion-to-be, shooting a 35-4-75, to the champion's 41-39-80.
