away Friday at her home in Burlington, Wis., after a lingering illness. Miss McNamara had taught in Lake County for fifteen years, ten of which were in the Gorton School in Lake Forest. She also had taught in Antioch. Funeral services for Miss McNamara were held Monday at Burlington. Surviving her is her mother, Mrs. Mary McNamara.

"The History of Deerfield" contains the following about the deceased:

"Miss Mayme J. McNamara, the only woman principal since the Deerfield School has had two rooms, had a most sympathetic understanding of the adolescent girls. She organized the school library and had a room furnished as a reading room, and a rest room, also. Her discipline of the boys was exemplary, inasmuch as she never used any corporal punishment."
