AN ORDINANCE FOR THE LEVY OF TAXES FOR THE CURRENT FISCAL YEAR BEGINNING MAY 1st, 1933, AND ENDING APRIL 30th, 1934.
BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF DEERFIELD, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:
SECTION 1. That the sum of \$45,185.00, this sum being the total amount of all appropriations for special and corporate fund purposes legally made, and to be collected from the tax levy of the fiscal year beginning May 1st, 1933, and ending April 30th, 1934, shall be and the same is hereby levied on all property subject to taxation within the Village of Deerfield as the said property is assessed for state and county purposes for the current year.
