Manufacturers of electric washing machines and electric ironers have announced substantial price increases on all models effective September 1. Mounting production expenses, including higher costs of raw materials, are making these price advances imperative.

"Prices should have been raised on August 1," a prominent manufacturer of washing machines recently stated. "But because several dealers had planned special activities this month, we have agreed to postpone our price advance until September 1."

"Summer sales on home laundry appliances have been unusually heavy.
