

Northern Illinois Is Fisherman's Paradise

"As modern a means of travel as we have, there are very few who avail themselves of the pleasures available within an hour's drive of the North Shore, we are told by an ardent disciple of Isaac Walton.

"Did you ever look at a detailed map of the northern Illinois lake region? It is literally covered with lakes. In this section, there are lakes which are reached by paved highways, or if you wish a more secluded place, lakes back in which are reached by good dirt roads, sometimes through farmers' yards and down through the woods. Beautiful little lakes, fringed with trees and grassy meadows, which only lack the pine tree odor to make you imagine yourself in the north woods.

"Our Conservation Department in Illinois is stocking with fish by the millions. Every year, most of these lakes are stocked with from a million to five million fish of all varieties. In the last two years, over 50,000,000 wall-eyed pike alone have been planted in these waters.

"That brings up the subject of catching them, not in the sense of the quantity brought home, but in the sport and fun of catching them. "The fly-rod fisherman is probably the one who can show the most consistent catches throughout the season. The sport of catching large fish—bass, pickerel, pike, and even muskies—on the fly rod is only comparable with catching tuna, tarpon and other salt water fish on a casting rod.

"It is not unusual to see the fly rod fisherman bring home the limit of legal size bass, caught in our local lakes, and catching them on a fly rod represents real sport.

"Several Lake Forest and Highland Park stores display fishing equipment of all kinds, and you can even take fly rod casting lessons from an Eanston man, Jay Johnson, who also manufactures fly rod fishing tackle. Mr. Johnson's lessons are given every Thursday evening, free of charge, at Bill Hackett's boat landing, located on the east shore of Diamond Lake.

"A few of the dandy bass lakes in our lake region are Silver Lake and Diamond Lake. Silver Lake is located just north of Cary. Another good lake is Wauconda Lake at Wauconda."

Post Office Fire Of Unknown Origin

The fire department was called out Saturday morning at two o'clock to extinguish a fire at the Deerfield Post Office, which had started in the awning and had burned away part of the cornice. The fire was discovered by a Scheskie boy from Highland Park. Please say to it that my greetings and best wishes are extended to each of thirty thousand troops of Scouts and other units, as well as to the officers and members of their local councils.

The fact that one million two hundred sixty-two thousand men and boys were in 1932 members of the Boy Scouts of America is impressive testimony as to how vital a factor scouting has become in the life of America's youth.

I firmly believe that the Boy Scout movement represents a new era of moral force in America.

I hope every possible effort will be made to avoid curtailment of all character building agencies during this difficult period.

Special words of encouragement and help should be given to those men who serve as scoutmasters.

One of the exhibits is an outdoor woodcraft exhibit where a number of Scouts will work in a woodcraft village constructing pioneer projects and demonstrating various Scouting activities.

The following troops will be represented in that village, Troop 51 of Deerfield with ten boys working on Indian lore under the leadership of Ray Dobbins, the North Shore Area Council is taking on the unique project under Mr. S. E. Ostergaard's leadership of actually surveying and mapping the woodcraft exhibit. They will work for that surveying merit badge. Troop 13 of Kenilworth under Scoutmaster Dewitt Jones will have ten Scouts demonstrating fry by flint and steel. Troop 19 of Winnetka has worked hard all summer under the leadership of their Scoutmaster Mr. H. D. Frankel Jr.

and Mr. C. A. Waite of the North Shore Line in preparing a first aid drill demonstration. About eight Scouts from miscellaneous troops are planning a rope spinning demonstration under the leadership of Milton Merritt, Troop 52, Deerfield.

The other exhibit is the handicraft booth located on the Enchanted Island where Scouts will be busy all day working on their ability to visit parents and children.

The woodcraft exhibit is between the eastern skyride tower and the lake shore. The handicraft exhibit is immediately south of the children's mountain in the Enchanted Island.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING THE WATER ORDINANCE OF THE VILLAGE OF DEERFIELD, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS, FIXING DATES OF READING METERS AND BILLING CUSTOMERS, AND PROVIDING FOR A RATE IN-STALLMENT CHARGE AND MINIMUM CHARGE.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF DEERFIELD, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

SECTION 1. That the Water Ordinance or Ordinances of the Village of Deerfield, Lake County, Illinois, shall be changed and amended as follows:

All water meters in the Village of Deerfield, Lake County, Illinois, shall be read by the said Village once each month hereafter, and all customers shall be billed monthly in accordance with said readings.

SECTION 2. That the rate charged the consumer for water shall be 48¢ per hundred for the first thousand cubic feet, 35¢ per hundred for the next fifteen hundred cubic feet, 58¢ per hundred for the next twenty-five hundred cubic feet, and all above five hundred cubic feet to 26¢ per hundred cubic feet. The above rates shall apply to all users of water of said Village, and shall be subject to and allowed a discount of 5¢ per hundred cubic feet on the entire bill if paid within ten (10) days of billing date thereof.

SECTION 3. All properties equipped for use of water from the Village of Deerfield shall be charged at the rate of 50¢ per month when such property is not using water from said village, whether the meter shall be removed from said premises or not, the above charge being in the interest of fire protection for the property owner and the citizens of the Village of Deerfield. In addition, there shall be a \$2.00 installment charge for installing or re-installing any meter, whether the same shall have been removed for cause or at the request of the owner or occupant of the premises.

SECTION 4. Any ordinance or part of ordinance in conflict herewith are hereby expressly repealed.

SECTION 5. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after the date of its passage, approval and publication, according to law.

AN ORDINANCE AMENDING AN ORDINANCE TO PROVIDE REGULATIONS FOR THE ERECTION, CONSTRUCTION, ALTERATION, REPAIR, REMOVAL, SAFETY AND INSPECTION OF BUILDINGS, WALLS, FENCES AND STRUCTURES OR PORTION THEREOF, IN THE VILLAGE OF DEERFIELD, ILLINOIS.

BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF DEERFIELD, LAKE COUNTY, ILLINOIS:

That the building ordinance of the Village of Deerfield be amended as follows:

SECTION 1. That from Section 2 of said ordinance the following words "costing more than Two Hundred Dollars" be stricken, and adding in lieu thereof "costing more than \$10.00."

SECTION 2. That Section 4 of said ordinance entitled "Fees For Permits" be amended to read: "The fees for building permits shall be \$1.00 per \$500.00 or fraction thereof, up to the estimated cost of \$1.00; and \$1.00 per \$1,000.00 for each additional \$1,000."

SECTION 3. That Section 8 of said ordinance entitled "Incombustible Construction Defined" be amended by adding thereto "improved Cinder block," following the words "Metal lath and Portland cement plaster."

SECTION 4. All ordinances and parts of ordinances inconsistent herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION 5. This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and publication as required by law.
