## POSTOFFICE ASKS FOR CO-OPERATION

### Local Postmaster Assisting In Signing Up All Employers, Consumers Under NRA

An appeal for all local business men, and all local residents as well, to cooperate with the National Industrial Recovery Administration, has been made by the United States Postoffice Department, and transmitted to Hugo E. Schneider, postmaster at Highland Park.

The appeal to all postmasters of the country is signed by Thomas S. Hammond, executive director of the NRA program, and Joseph C. O'Mahoney, first assistant postmaster general. It repeats the appeal contained in the letters delivered to all employers by the postoffice department on Aug. 7.

In addition to assisting the government in signing up local business 100 per cent, the local postoffice is also assisting in signing up the consumers of this city, by distributing, through the business houses which have already signed the NRA blanket code, hundreds of Consumer's Statements of Cooperation, which read as follows:

"I will cooperate in reemployment by supporting and patronizing employers and workers who are members of NRA."

These pledges may be secured and signed at any local store displaying the blue eagle of the NRA, Mr. Schneider announces.

It is the aim of the NRA to sign up all business of the country, 100 per cent, before Sept. 1. All employers who are not working under the blanket code or other codes approved by the president, are urged to obtain the blue eagle at once, by three methods (all of which include the signing of the blanket code, or president's reemployment agreement) which, briefly stated, are as follows: by 100 per cent compliance, in case code has been submitted, and through petition for relief.

Complete information regarding these three methods can be obtained from Mr. Schneider, and the blanket code must be signed and delivered to the local postmaster, who provides the signer with the blue eagle emblem and the consumer's statements.

## Garden Class Visits Several Gardens In Evanston On Tuesday

The Community Garden Class of the Highland Park Woman's Club spent a delightful afternoon on Tuesday, Aug. 22, as guests of the Evanston Garden Club.

The members assembled at the club house at 2 p.m. and drove as a group to the home of Mrs. W. H. Colvin, 1100 Forest Avenue. Mrs. Colvin is the president of the Evanston Garden Club and is a most gracious hostess.

Although suffering from a recent injury and unable to accompany the class, she urged them to roam through her spacious grounds. The ladies agree that this is one of the most charming examples of landscaping that they have yet seen in their tours.

Although a section of this garden has been planted for a number of years, the greater part of it is only one year old. To those, who have gardens of their own, it seems almost a miracle that such perfection can be attained in so short a time.

Mrs. Colvin has in her garden many tropical plants that are not found in northern gardens. She admits that this is experimental as she hasn't had them long enough to see what can be accomplished with them. She also has beautiful displays of new species and colors of blooms, given her by local nurserymen, who know of her skill in experimental gardening. The vegetables in her vegetable garden are also outstanding. After the tour of the garden Mrs. Colvin served refreshments to her guests on her beautiful terrace.

The group was next invited to the home of Mrs. Gabriel Slaughter, 1408 Ridge Boulevard. Upon entering this garden the first impression was of the gorgeous blending of a glorious riot of color. Blending from palest yellow of an unusual species of zinnia, through the shades of lemon, orange, salmon, to deep red. Beautiful annuals in all these and many other shades of flaming color, interspersed with perennials and bulb plants. Borders, weaving in and out, of the heavier blooms with others of feathery lightness, giving the effect of a huge old-fashioned bouquet.

This garden was given meritorious mention by the Garden Club of America. Mrs. Slaughter informed the guests that her garden is a riot of blossoms from the beginning of spring to late autumn. She is her own landscape artist and superintends the setting of each plant, bulb and shrub, including the vegetable and fruit garden. This is entered through a pergola overhung with great bunches of white and purple grapes. Mrs. Slaughter invited her guests to enter her house which is a lovely old place eighty years old. It came into the possession of the Slaughter family in 1909. They have made various changes, but have kept the old time charm.

The next visit was at the home of Mrs. Robert Scott, 144 Greenwood Avenue. Here the wide, velvety lawns, spreading under and up to the very roots of the mammoth old willow trees make one stop and say, "How do they do it?"

This garden has been charmingly arranged for both use and beauty. With its tennis court, miniature golf course and summer houses, separated and secluded by rugged stone walls, vines and flowers, and its wide terraces and stone gateway opening to the lake make it surely one of Evanston's beauty spots.

The next and last garden visited by the Garden class was Shakespear's garden at Northwestern University. This beautiful garden has at its entrance a bronze statue of the man whose name it bears. Inscribed upon a bronze slab are extracts from his enchanting garden poems naming all of the flowers, trees and shrubs found in this interesting garden.

The Garden class is planning a trip to the Waukegan flats to study wild flowers.

When the 37th annual women's tournament of the United States Golf Association opens at Exmoor Country Club, Highland Park, next Monday, golf enthusiasts will find many familiar faces among the 119 contestants. Almost all of the entries played in the Western Women's Championship, held on the same course in 1931, which brought Mrs. O. S. Hill of Kansas City the title when she defeated Mrs. Leona Pressler of Los Angeles, 3 and 1.

Ever since Monday the course has been given practice tests by several of the stars who find it possible to get to Exmoor. Those who have not already played a round or so on this great course are expected to be before the qualifying rounds start Monday. The 6473 yards at Exmoor are well trapped and are by no means easy going. The greens and fairways are as usual in perfect condition, something you will always find at this course.
