report on the work of his group and declared that the general spirit locally seemed very favorable to the NRA movement.

While some opposition is being met in certain quarters, and some evidences of failure to cooperate are seen, little difficulty is anticipated in bringing these into line when the "big stick" of the President is wielded in the near future.

Concerted efforts of a speakers bureau of twenty-five prominent local citizens under the direction of the educational committee, is sought by Mayor Metzler. Pamphlets containing full information in regard to the NRA are to be supplied from Washington for the use of these speakers.

Trailers and films for the use of the local theatre have been ordered by the publicity colonial to educate the public in the purpose and methods of the NRA through that medium.

Local merchants who have signed up under the NRA blanket code are being supplied with stickers for the use of consumers. These Blue Eagle stickers will be given to any householder or resident who signs a pledge card at any of the local stores displaying the Blue Eagle. They may be used on cars or on doors or windows.

No attention whatsoever will be paid to anonymous complaints regarding violation of the NRA blanket code, or of the industrial codes, according to the decision of the committee at yesterday's meeting.

Such complaints as are unsigned or made by telephone by persons who refuse to disclose their identity, will receive no consideration whatsoever, and will not even be investigated.

While no authority has as yet been vested in the local committee as to the enforcement of the codes, such complaints as are properly signed and identified will be taken up with the authorities in charge of this district for attention.

Local Travel Bureau Distributing Air Race Literature, Stickers

George Woodward, regional director of the International Air and Gordon Bennett Balloon Races, has been in Highland Park conferring with civic leaders and making arrangements with the H. and R. Anspach Travel Bureau, 386 Central Avenue, for the distribution of information and literature, such as automobile windshield stickers, window cards and tickets.

The International Air Races and Gordon - Bennett Balloon Races, which will be held at Curtiss-Beynolds Airport, Sept. 1, 2, 3, 4, form the aviation finale of A Century of Progress, and are expected to be the outstanding competitive aviation events of the year.

Invitations to send entries to Chicago for both the heavier-and lighter-than-air events have been extended to the 33 nations having aeronautical societies affiliated with the Federation Aeronautique Internationale, the world-governing body for air sports.

Ten entries have been received already in the race for the coveted Gordon-Bennett trophy, which will be defended for the United States by Lieut. Cmdr. T. G. W. Settle, U.S.N., who won the event last year from a field of 16 contenders by piloting the U. S. Navy bag from Basle, Switzerland, to a point on the Russian-Polish border, 921 miles distant.

Lieut. Wilford J. Paul and Sergeant Joseph H. Bishop have been selected to pilot the U. S. Army entry. This team won the national elimination contest at Omaha in 1932, and were to represent the United States as one of the three American teams in the international competition, but lack of funds prevented their participation. The Goodyear Tire and Rubber Company has entered a balloon.
