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## HORSE SHOW WILL HONOR GEN. PARKER

### Eighth Annual Event At Fort Sheridan Will Be Oct. 22, 23

Maj.-Gen. Frank Parker and Brig.-Gen. F. C. Bolles are the honorary presidents of the eighth annual Fort Sheridan Horse Show, to be held on the beautiful field by the lake at Fort Sheridan on Friday and Saturday, Oct. 22 and 23.

The show is expected to be unusually large, and attract an unusual amount of attention this year, because it will be honoring Gen. Parker, who has been transferred from the command of the Sixth Corps Area to the Philippine Department, and will leave Chicago soon after the event here.

Gen. Bolles, commandant at Fort Sheridan, will be the other honorary president.

Maj. Harry D. Chamberlain will be the president of the horse show this year. Lt. G. S. Smith will be secretary-treasurer, and Maj. P. T. Carpenter will be managing director.

## LARGE ENROLLMENT

Enrollment for the fall term at the Deerfield-Shields High School yesterday afternoon was 1473—a figure considerably larger than the enrollment at the end of the second day of school last fall.

Fifteen hundred students are expected to attend Deerfield-Shields this year. Enrollment has been increasing at the rate of about 150 a year. Advance enrollment this year—that is, enrollment before the first day of school, which was Tuesday—was 1371.

There are almost no graduate students registered at the high school this fall, owing to the charge of \$100 per student. There were between 60 and 70 graduate students last year.

## VIRGINIA VAN WIE IS STILL CHAMPION

### "Little Duchess" Defeats Helen Hicks In Brilliant Last Round At Exmoor

Miss Virginia Van Wie, the "Little Duchess" from Beverly Country Club, won the battle of her 24 years when she staged the greatest comeback in the history of women's golf to win her second consecutive national championship at Exmoor Country Club last Saturday, defeating Miss Helen "Billie" Hicks of Inwood, New York, 4 and 3.

Virginia had to overcome a lead, held by Helen Hicks of 4 up, to win on the thirty-third hole by the same margin. Helen gained this lead at the fourteenth hole but lost two of the remaining four holes to lead at the end of the first round, 2 up.

During the afternoon Virginia began to get a foothold, and started toward victory and the championship. She evened the count at the 23rd hole and never faltered from then on.

### Champion Outclasses Opponents

After a week of the greatest rounds of championship golf women have exhibited in some time, we can say that Virginia was unbeatable, after we look back at her card of victories that finally gave her the title. During her performance at Exmoor she played out ten full 9's, and had as an average a par 38. Par on the first nine is 39 and on the second nine is 40, so you can draw your own conclusion as to the type of golf Miss Van Wie played during the past week.

In the semi-final round she beat perhaps the most feared contestant in the tourney, namely, Miss Enid Wilson of Nottingham, England. Miss Wilson is champion of the Robin Hood Country Club and played flawless golf during her march to the championship until she was tripped by Miss Van Wie, 6 and 5.
