**Dinner-Meeting Held By the Local Chamber Of Commerce Monday**

The Highland Park Chamber of Commerce held its regular monthly meeting Tuesday evening at 6:30 at the Green Tea Pot. Thirty-eight members were present.

Due to the importance of various business matters, no speaker was secured for the meeting.

A communication was read from Dorcas Home expressing thanks to the Chamber of Commerce for furnishing bus transportation for the children to Lincoln Park and return on Aug. 16.

Herman Denzel made a report of his committee's investigation with Mayor E. B. Metzger on the proposed public parking space between the two railroads from Central avenue to Elm Place. The committee decided to defer further efforts until next spring.

President H. F. Kelley, of the Chamber of Commerce, outlined the U. S. government's attitude on the erection of post office buildings throughout the country at this time. Although an appropriation has already been made for a Highland Park post office building, it is felt that such is inadequate, and a committee consisting of Paul Udell, Mortimer A. Singer, Raymond Erskine, Clarence Witt and Hugo L. Schneider, will contact the postal authorities with a view of obtaining a larger appropriation and an early construction for a Highland Park building.

The application for a franchise before the Illinois Commerce Commission of several trucking and bus companies to operate scheduled thru routes over Sheridan and Green Bay roads from Chicago to Milwaukee was explained by President Kelley. Contesting the issuance of such a franchise is the North Shore Property Owners' Association.

After some discussion of the Highland Park Police Department's desire to have short-wave radios installed in the squad cars, President Kelley appointed Fred Gallagher, Robert Denzel, and L. E. Pierron as a committee to aid the city council in effecting some financial solution, that this added police protection may be made possible to the residents of Highland Park.

With the possible completion of State Route 57 during the latter part of October, and since both Prairie Avenue and Central Avenue have previously been known as thru streets, a motion was carried recommending to the city of Highland Park that temporary stop signs be erected at these intersections until permanent traffic signals are erected by the proper authorities.

There was a general discussion under various codes of the NRA as applicable to local conditions.
