Illinois Recommends Local Projects For Federal Financing

The Horner administration last week recommended more than 300 Illinois public works projects, including several on the North Shore, totaling \$117,843,909 for federal financing and construction under the National Industrial Recovery Act.

The extensive list of projects will be submitted to the federal public works advisory board for Illinois, which has transmitted to Washington the proposal it endorses. Final approval must come from public works officials in Washington.

Waterworks and sewage plants are predominant on the list. The federal government will finance outright as much as 30 per cent of the projects it approves.

The list includes the following projects on the North Shore: water works systems for Lake Forest, Wilmette and Evanston; sewage systems for Highland Park, Highwood, Waukegan and Winthrop Harbor; and a new high school for Lake Forest.

High School Teachers Will Be "Chaperons" Of Pupils On Trains

Twelve members of the Deerfield-Shields High School faculty have been deputized and "sworn in" at the Lake County sheriff's office, and will act as official "chaperons" for the students at the high school who ride the North Shore trains on their way to and from classes.

The "chaperoned" students will include those attending high school from Lake Forest, Lake Bluff, Ravinia and Highwood. Five of the teachers will have morning "beats," while seven will work on the afternoon and evening "shifts."

The teachers who are serving as "pedagogic deputies" are W. F. Einbecker, Lucie Burwash, B. J. Ballard, Louise Whiteman, H. C. Wright, Christine MacMartin, Ellen Knox, Mrs. Ruth Martin, Lucille Campbell, Daniel Davitt, Margaret Kerfoot and Anne Chester.

High School Instructor Compiles Record Book

A new type of class record book in six week's form is being compiled by Stanley F. Nelson, instructor in mathematics at Deerfield-Shields High School, in collaboration with Walter Netterblad of the Stoughton, Wis., High School.

The book will be published by the Bruce Publishing Company and will soon be available in all secondary institutions. It has, among other features, an attendance code which provides for marks of a distinguishing nature for each pupil.

Things To Cook

All children like cookies, therefore, it is a good idea to give them cookies that are not too rich, yet wholesome and appetizing. I believe it is hard to excel the oatmeal wafer, as its ingredients are very healthful.

Oatmeal Wafers

- 1/4 cup rolled oats
- 1/4 cup whole wheat flour
- 1 cup white flour
- 2 tablespoons brown sugar
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 4 tablespoons butter

Hot water, about 6-tablespoons.

Place first five ingredients in mixing bowl; add soft butter and work with fork like pie crust. Add enough hot water to make soft dough. Toss onto slightly floured board and roll as thin as possible. Cut with oblong cookie cutter and bake in moderate oven (350 degrees) for 30 minutes, or until golden brown.
