Deerfield Rejects Plan to Rezone for Catholic Hospital

The Deerfield Board of Appeals held a public hearing Friday evening in the village offices at the Masonic Temple and at the conclusion of a heated debate voted unanimous ly to reject the plea of several re estate concerns to change eight four acres from Class A to Class zoning in order to sell the property to the Alexian Brothers for a hospital.

L. E. Ashman, chairman of the Board of Appeals, presided and his entire committee was present including Milton Frantz, C. E. Christensen, Marshall Pottenger and Frank Kottrasch.

A petition with eighty-five signers opposing the proposition was presented and numerous letters, also against, were read. Their main objection was that the village would be changed from a home atmosphere to that of an institutional one, and that they were satisfied with the zoning ordinance as it stood.

A great many objectors were heard from the floor on the tax question.

Mr. Ashman called for those in favor to talk, also. Their points were that it would increase the size of the postoffice, improve transportation on the railroad, bring more people here and improve business, as well as use up some of the vacant property.

At times the discussion became tense with excitement, but the situation was capably handled by the chairman.

Summary of Question The Alexian Brothers of Chicago,

Catholic organization, entered into contract to purchase 84 acres in the northwest part of the village (within the city limits) for the purpose of erecting a hospital for the training of young men to become nurses in a hospital restricted entirely to men. This was to be the first unit of a contemplated group of educational buildings on an elaborately-landscaped tract, representing a total investment of close to a half million dollars.

Brother Gerard, head of the order, in a letter to the village board at the beginning of negotiations, had stated that although the Illinois law exempted educational and religious brook, played the piano. institutions from taxation, both taxes and assessments would be paid at the present time.

Mrs. John Weir Speaks of India

Gandhi, in his work for the outcasts, the "Untouchables" of India, is influenced by his contacts with Christianity. Mohammedism Hinduism does not advocate the amelioration of conditions of the lower classes. The administration of Christ's teachings is Gandhi work, Mrs. John Weir, of Lahore, India, told the women of Deerfield at a meeting Thursday, of the Woman's Missionary Society of the Deerfield Presbyterian Church, at which women from the other churches were

Mrs. Weir is an unusually beautiful woman with a surpassing radiance of countenance. She appeared in an exquisite pastel pink Indian georgette native gown with a sari with bands of gold embroidery upon it, and the brocaded satin slippers of the high class woman. The material in her gown resembled a sheer pineapple tissue

On her previous visit to Deerfield Mrs. Weir took her listeners on an imaginary visit to the homes of her pupils. Her husband, Dr. John Weir, teaches in Lahore, also.

Mrs. Weir is in a school for girls where there are 260 Mohammedan girls. There are nine colleges for men and two for women.

On this visit Mrs. Weir described the home of a missionary and the extraordinary demands made upon it by guests, refuting the charges. that missignaries are maintained in luxury. She told of the teas and dinners given to the natives and the value of this type of work needed to give the natives an insight into a Christian home. All Hindus live their ancestral homes, whereas Christians have saparate ones.

She told of the compensation for the lack of conveniences in Oriental homes. Dust and the heat between March and October are greatest. Malaria prevails during the entire year but is at its worst in September. Dr. and Mrs. Weir expect to be back in Lahore this winter.


