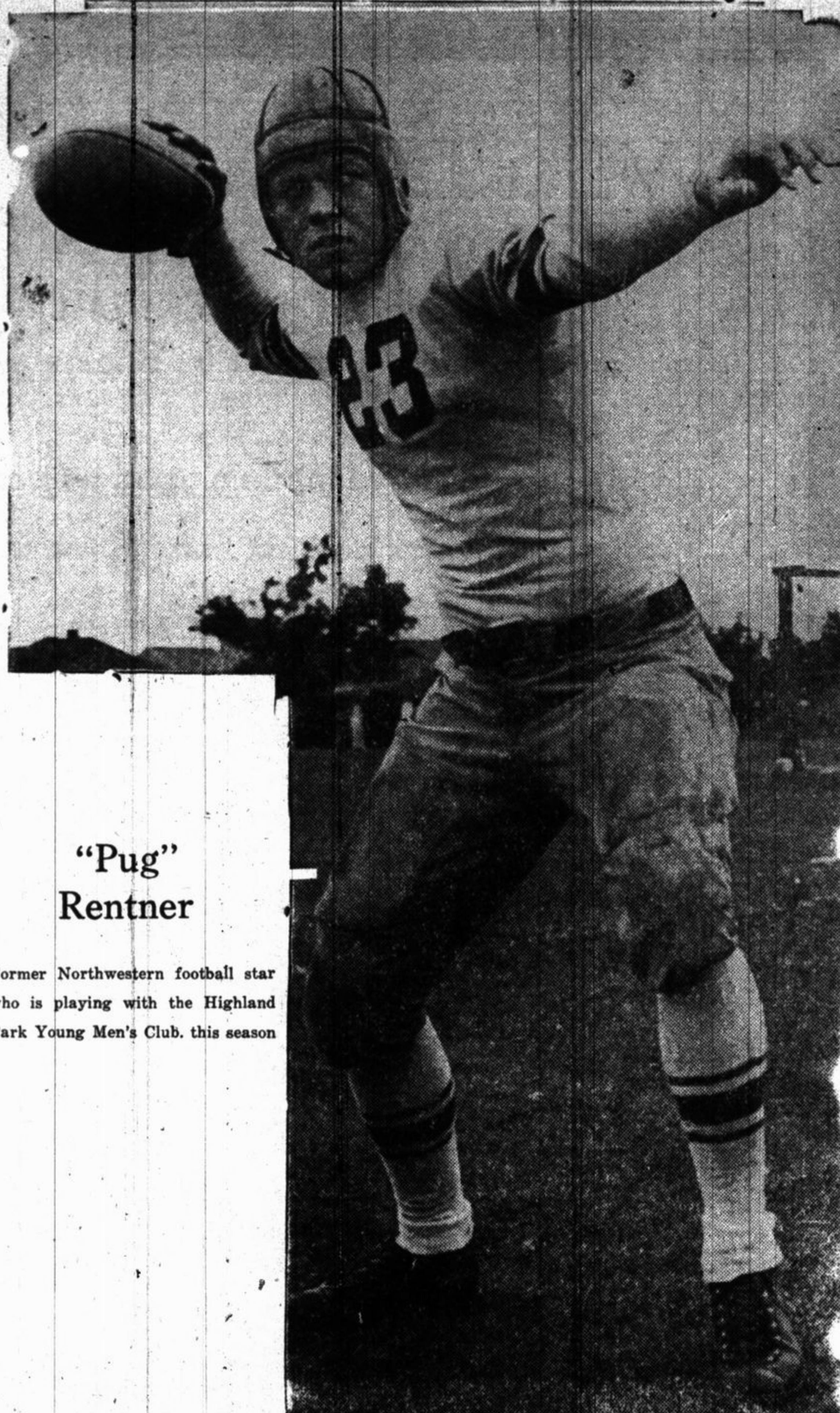

Presbyterian Church Increases Attendance

Pew renting and the ancient custom of collecting of stipends has been discontinued in the Presbyterian church.
