COURT OF HONOR
Plans are now being made to go back to the old plan of district Courts of Honor and area Courts of Honor in the second half of the higher awards. It is still planned to have second class work and the special requirements for first class work be taken care of by the troop committee and the scoutmaster.

It is also planned to develop just as rapidly a possible merit badge system in all of our districts so that there should be a regular time at which merit badge counselors meet and give opportunity to the boys to pass the award of the merit badge. Within two weeks it is hoped that a formal announcement may be made in many of the districts concerning this.

It is planned in most cases to have a district Court of Honor at least once every two months and there will be two or three all area courts in the course of the year. The first area court is to be Friday, February 9th.

Girl Scout News

The nineteenth annual Girl Scout Convention was held last week at Milwaukee and many exciting and interesting things were disclosed to the delegates and leaders who attended. The New Trier Council had seventeen of their leaders and council members at the meetings.

What is a Girl Scout?—Any girl who wishes to become a scout and join the varied program of girl scouting may become a scout. She must be ten years old and have attended four meetings to make sure she really likes girl scouting before she may join. If she is not ten but more than seven she may become a Brownie. Brownies have a lovely time. They too, learn to be helpful and to be good sports, to work and play in groups just as their older sisters; but they have their meetings in very special ways, usually in fairyland.

The Girl Scout troop—belongs to the girl. It is planned in such a way that the girls elect and govern their own meetings. Each troop is divided into small groups called patrols. Each patrol elects its own leader who meets with the troop leaders and plan the activities of the group. The girls through their patrol leaders have a voice in all troop plans. And what fun they do have. Ask any girl from any one of the seventeen troops or become a scout and you will know it.

The Girl Scout program there are all working and playing together in the same way. Each year some of the girls are elected to go and camp in Switzerland at the International and England during the past year. They have learned one-another's folk dances and songs. They do have fun.
