Chicago Again Plans for Huge Stock Show

With the approaching International Live Stock Exposition in Chicago, agriculture is again heading toward the year's largest and most spectacular display of its many industries.

It will be the 34th anniversary of this huge spectacle of prize live stock, crops, and scores of other farming exhibits. The show will be held this year from Dec. 2 to 9 in its permanent home which covers an area of 25 acres of exhibition halls, amphitheatre, and barns at the entrance to the Chicago live stock market.

Entries for the various live stock classes of the Exposition will close on Nov. 1. The large number of early entries, many of them including show herds from the leading live stock farms of this country and Canada, leads B. H. Heide, secretary-manager of the Exposition, to predict that the International Live Stock Show will this year continue its annual custom of outdistancing its predecessors in the size and impressiveness of its displays.

Edgar Ansel Mower to Talk on Germany

A true picture and interpretation of present policies and conditions that prevail in Germany will be offered by an outstanding national journalist and student of foreign affairs at a public lecture in Orchestra Hall Wednesday evening, Nov. 1.

The address, "Germany—Behind the Scenes," will be given by Edgar Ansel Mower, foreign correspondent of the Chicago Daily News, who has just arrived in America after nine years of residence in Berlin. Mr. Mower will attempt to bring to his Orchestra Hall audience a lecture that will present both sides of the turmoil that surges in Germany, outlining the policies and philosophy of Adolph Hitler and reviewing the arguments of the Nazi group. He will speak as an impartial observer of German developments in an effort to bring a true picture of German affairs to his Chicago audience.

The lecture is under the auspices of the National Lecture Bureau. Silas H. Strawn, international lawyer, will introduce Mr. Mower.

Edgar Ansel Mower, in his many years of newspaper service abroad, has acquired a knowledge of conditions and an insight into German national character that is possessed by few non-Germans. He is the winner of the Pulitzer Prize for the best

foreign correspondence in 1933; he has been a friend and occasional adviser to many German statesmen, is a veteran World War reporter, and he was until recently the president of the Foreign Press Association in Berlin. Mr. Mower's work has taken him to many parts of Europe and has given him a background of first hand knowledge about persons and places seldom acquired by an American abroad.
