Mrs. Anna Kastrop and Walter Jonkers of River Forest visited Miss Anna Kruse at the E. H. Selig home on Sunday.

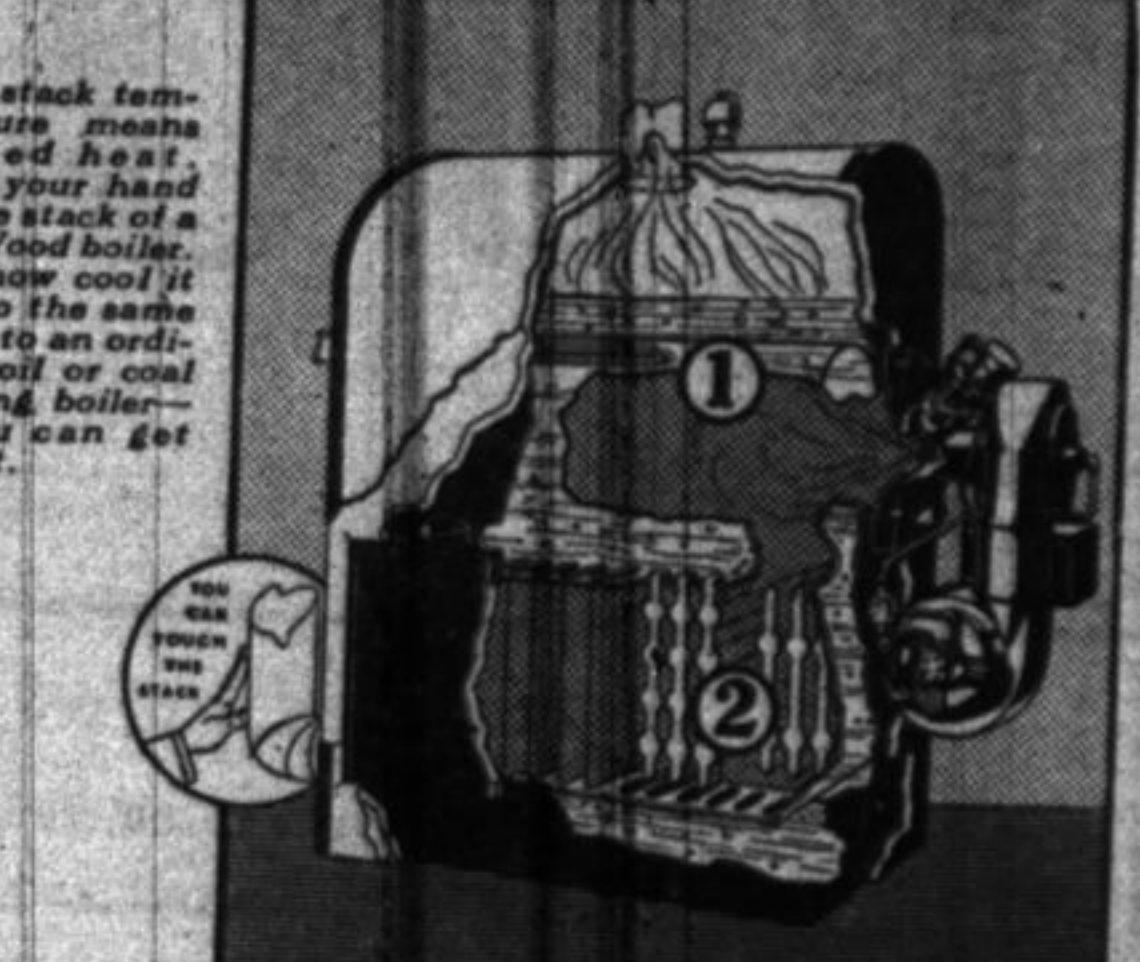
Mrs. Harry Clavey was hostess to the Arme Club, Wednesday evening.
