game last year. We might also mention, while we're on the subject, that they have won most of their games minus the services of their so-called All-Americans.

The Lake Forest team, on the other hand, are no "pansies." They showed that last year. They have the same outfit this year with the exception of a few new members from Highwood's disbanded eleven. This bunch of men pack a powerful punch and hope to pack one powerful Sunday to avenge their disheartening defeat last year, which cost them the North Shore championship. Their chances are in doubt, but nevertheless we caution you when it comes to betting because rivalries like this one usually do strange things to the players involved.

**Lake Forest an Aggressive Team**  
The Lake Forest practitioners have an aggressive team made up of fellows who seem to live to play football. Although beaten in their first encounter by Kenosha, 2-0, they have come back strong and have faced the Austin Club and the Racine pros on two successive Sundays without letting them cross their well-defended goal line.

Coach Lindenmeyer, who when not coaching this team is marking time at Deerfield-Shields High School, has plenty to worry the Highland Park boys with. Since their first defeat they have bolstered their attack to A-No. 1 perfection. He has a group of high school and college stars who are well prepared for the worst, if such comes about.

Director R. H. Peters, of the Lake Forest Young Men's Club, gave us as near as possible the starting lineup and as much dope on the team as he dared let out.

Beginning at the center position we find two possible starters, namely, Fitzgerald, 180 pounds, and Dieck, whose weight we are uncertain about. The guards are Peterson, Smith, and Geraghty. Peterson, a former Deerfield lineman, and Smith, the heaviest man on the squad, weighing 215, are the likely beginners. At tackle we find two "little" fellows who are by no means strangers to the Highland Park team. These chaps, who are as light as heifers, are Gansberg, 210 pounds, and White, another 210 pounder. The ends who are also tiny men are Sage, 170 pounds, and Baldwin, 190 pounds. Simonds, a Miami University grad, will probably see action at an end position also.

Leo Zanier, who while at Deerfield-Shields was known for his speed, will start at quarter, with McConnell, another comet, as an understudy. At the half back positions we see quite a few capable men, the outstanding being Setrok-

ian, a product of Waukegan High School, and Christenson, a former Deerfield mainstay. Neither of these men weigh more than 150 pounds. The heavy men are at full. These men, whose weight play an important part in breaking up opponents lines are Lenkerd, 190 pounds, and the elder Christenson, also a 190 pounder. Cronkite, a 200 pounder who last year played with Highwood, may see action if he recovers from injuries suffered in the game last Sunday.

**Highland Parks Strength Known**  
The strength of the Highland Park undefeated Young Men's Club eleven is well known in this vicinity. Their past performances show evidence of this and for those who haven't heard we will try and enlighten you on the subject.

The powerful Highland Park unit have crushed four potential challengers and are anxiously looking forward to the fifth. They beat the Peter Fox Boosters 27-6, romped over the Cicero Boosters, who had previously played the Chicago Bears, 25-0. Then they out-played the Fuqua Professionals 22-6, and last Sunday they ended up on the long end of a 13-0 score against the Berwyn Legion Parrots. From that you are obliged to form your own opinion of their strength and possible chances.

The line from end to end shows power and speed, averaging some where around the 185-pound mark. They have former college and university stars from various schools in the east and mid-west, the majority of this array of football talent have lived in Highland Park most of their lives, the rest live near by and know the strong rivalry between these two towns.

The old maestro "Hook" Kress, who has had a year's experience at Missouri University, will be at center. Mason and Foreman, two more "little" men weighing well over 200 pounds, will be at the guard positions. George Schwalback, Dom Bartoli, and "Moon" Stipe are the reserves for this position. Schwalback played on the championship Lake Forest Academy team last year. Two former Illini pigskin maulers will see action at the tackle berths. They are Stan Bodman and Otto Hills, who weigh well over 200 pounds. Stan is Coach Gilles' able assistant, taking care of the line duties. A newcomer, Ray Murphy, from Brown University, will be in there as well as Bud Moon and Carroll Risdon. The ends comparatively light, but plenty fast and scrappy are, Art Bock, Abe Carr, and Ed Wyle. "Spider" Reinhardt, the teams Man Mountain and inspiration, will be at the game, but his appearance is doubtful, due to a mean knee injury.

**"Pug" Reminer in Backfield**  
The backfield, strengthened by the services of Ernest "Pug" Reminer, Northwestern's former All-American and captain, will show plenty of class and flash. "Pug" doesn't stand alone in prominence for he has plenty of company with, for example, Carl Parker, Lake Forest College's former great decathlon expert. It was Parker who last year was responsible for Highland Park's last minute victory drive that upset the Foresters.

Carl Becker a Principia product, will be at the helm for the home town team. Carl weighs but 160, but handles the team the way champions should be handled. It has been his great generalship that has been largely responsible for his team's string of victories to date. Bill Lutz and Bill Hammond loom up into the spotlight. Bill a congenial fellow has everything any coach could ask for. Lutz on the other hand takes over Becker's duties when he's called upon. Tom Rogan the other halfback, who will undoubtedly see action, is the fastest man on the squad. Tom while in high school could cover the century in 10 seconds and the 220-yard dash in comparatively as fast time.

Lester Allen, a stubby 190 pounder, will alternate with Parker at full. The other backfield men who will be in the game at one time or another are: E. Enchelmeier, formerly played with New Trier High School, and Raeburn, who played with the Army team at Fort Sheridan. Both men are capable halves, each specializing in passing and kicking.

Anything else that Coach Gilles, who by-the-way is an All-American from Cornell University weighing somewhere around 265 pounds, will come out Sunday afternoon. Coach Gilles has looked forward to the Lake Forest game with great expectation and may spring a surprise in one way or another. Who knows?

**Officials Chosen**  
The officials for the game were wisely chosen and we think that both clubs should be congratulated for their fine choice. These men are head coach "Solly" Thurston, and line coach David Floyd from

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Deerfield-Shields High School. The third member of the trio is Robby Robinson, a former All-Southern tackle from the University of Florida. Robinson has been officiating at prep school games, and has worked almost all of the Young Men's Club games. Next year, if Robby is chosen, he will officiate in Big Ten games, which is quite an honor.

A large crowd is expected to attend the game and if my guess is right it will be some crowd. Last year's Thanksgiving Day game brought more people out than attend most of the big games, so here's hoping for the best. ### Only 13 Veterans of the Civil War Living in Lake County Now

More than 2,000 Lake County men participated in the Civil War, between the years 1861 and 1865, and today but 13 G. A. R. veterans are to be found in this county, according to Silas Nichols, commander of the Waukegan G. A. R. post.

In fact, there are but 26,000 Civil War veterans still living in the entire country, according to latest government figures.

Lake County during the days of the Civil War, had but 19,000 inhabitants. This county sent 1,800 men to war as volunteers, and the remaining 400 enlistments were conscripts. In 1865 Editor Charles Partridge wrote in the Waukegan Gazette that:

"Lake County furnished, during the four years from April, 1861, to April, 1865, about 2,000 men for the various branches of service, of whom more than 1,600 were volunteers, and this with a population of less than 19,000. Indeed it is probable that her volunteers were considerably in excess of the number stated, as owing to her proximity to Chicago, many men drifted there to enlist, and were credited to Cook County, especially at the time when the draft was impending and large bounties were being offered."

### Pioneer North Shore Resident Dies Oct. 12

Frederick Treptow of 1411 Lake Avenue, Wilmette, a resident of the North Shore for 61 years, passed away Oct. 12, at the age of 87 years. He was born Jan. 10, 1846, in Kamissow, Belgard, Germany. Mr. Treptow belonged to troop 9 of the Coburg Grenadier Regiment in the Franco-Prussian war. In 1872 he came to this country and settled in Deerfield. He was married in 1877 to Caroline Hillebrecht of Winnetka. Several years later, they moved to Evanston, where his wife died in 1903. In 1911 he moved to Wilmette where he resided until his death. He was a retired employe of the C. & N. W. Railroad. The funeral services were conducted by Rev. H. W. Meyer of St. John's Lutheran Church, on Monday of last week. Burial was at Niles Center. Surviving him are his three daughters, Miss Hattie Treptow and Mrs. E. Aschbacher of Wilmette, and Mrs. William Reckenwald of Highland Park; and four grand-children.

### Land Would Revert to Heirs IF Fort Sheridan Is Closed

To the question: "What would happen IF the government abandons, or closes, Fort Sheridan?" this is the proper answer: The land would revert to heirs of the original subscribers of money to buy the property.

Although talk of closing Fort Sheridan as a government reservation is classed as mere gossip in army circles, some people still insist on speculating what would happen to the land and buildings at the post.

The land now comprising Fort Sheridan was donated to the government originally. It is among the most valuable property along the north shore, and reversion to the heirs might result in a residential real estate boom.

The site was bought in 1887 when a group of Chicago business men formed a syndicate for the purpose of buying land to give to the government for a fort near Chicago.

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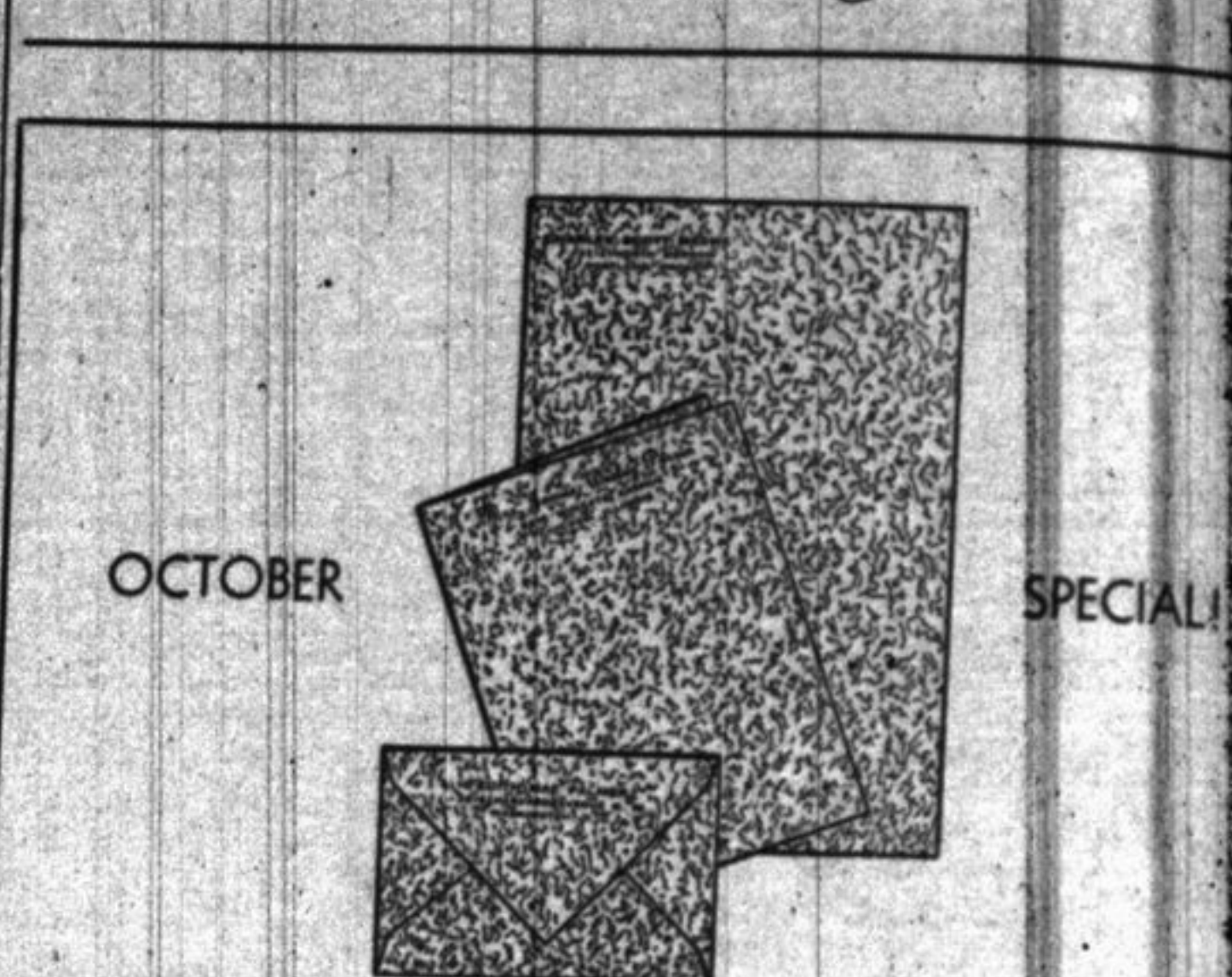
