## Robert E. Wood, 58, of Lake Bluff, Dies Of Pneumonia Tuesday

Robert E. Wood, of Lake Bluff, formerly editor of The Lake Forester and The Highland Park Press, died at his home Tuesday morning of pneumonia. Mr. Wood, who was 58, had been ill about a week.

He is survived by Mrs. Wood and three children, Miss Mildred Wood, of Lake Bluff; Howard Wood, also formerly editor of The Lake Forester and The Highland Park Press, now financial editor of The Chicago Tribune; and Robert Wood, also a Chicago newspaperman.

Mr. and Mrs. Wood came here in 1922 from Canton, where Mr. Wood had been editor of newspapers there, having been business manager of the Canton Daily Ledger immediately before coming to the North Shore. From that time until Nov. 1, 1932, he served as editor of The Forester and The Press. At that time he became editor of The Lake Forest News.

Funeral services will be held this afternoon (Thursday) at 1:30 at Lake Forest Presbyterian Church. Burial will be in the Naperville Cemetery.

## MISS CLAIRE TO STAR IN "BITTER SWEET"

Famous North Shore Prima Donna To Sing the Leading Role

Residents of Chicago's North Shore will have a special interest in attending Noel Coward's musical romance, "Bitter Sweet," which opens a limited engagement at the Grand Opera House Sunday night, Nov. 5. Marion Claire, internationally famous prima donna, and former star of the Chicago Civic Opera Company, will sing the leading role in "Bitter Sweet," and Miss Claire, as every one from Chicago's exclusive suburban area knows, has lived most of her young life on the North Shore—Lake Bluff to be exact.

Friends of this charming and talented young woman, who have followed her career from a young girl in her student days at Ferry Hall, at Lake Forest, through her years of study abroad with famous masters, and her consequent and successful debut in Italy, with further conquests throughout Germany and France, her triumphant return home, to be one of the leading prima donnas with the Chicago Civic Opera Company, and a leading concert artist, will eagerly await her entrance into another field, that of the light lyric stage. When Miss Claire appears as Sari Linden, the heroine of Noel Coward's charming operetta, she will be making her stage.

Although this will be Chicago's first opportunity to witness her appearance in anything but opera and concert, St. Louisans had that privilege last summer, when Miss Claire appeared as leading prima donna with the St. Louis Municipal Opera Company, and where she scored one of the most sensational successes ever accorded an artist with that organization. Here she first appeared as Sari Linden in "Bitter Sweet," and later as Jenny Lind in "Nightingale," in the title role of "Nina Rosa" and as Barbara Frietche in "My Maryland."

"Bitter Sweet" is the only musical piece by the eminent Mr. Coward to be presented in America, and further enjoys the distinction of being the only work of other than American origin that Florenz Ziegfeld ever produced. Its story covers a span of fifty years, beginning in the London of today, with cutbacks to the London of 1875, to the Vienna of 1890, and to the London of the gay '90's. Singing opposite Miss Claire will be the handsome tenor, Allan Jones, who scored here last season in "The Student Prince" and "Blossom Time." There will be other notable artists in the cast, including Leonard Ceely and Berna Deane, as well as a beautiful chorus.

## Ravinia Players Will Play "Second Fiddle" As First Production

Married to a man whose name she does not know, a man engaged to another girl, and facing the added complication of a fond mother who thinks her happily married, is quite a situation for any young girl to face.

In "Second Fiddle," the Ravinia Players' first production this season, a girl is found in just such a predicament. This series of complications also makes matters a bit strained for her hostess and two of her girl friends who are also guests. The man in the situation has his troubles, also, in view of the fact that he did not even know of the marriage, did not want to marry the girl, and does not want to remain married to her.

The hero's fiancée, the girl's mother, and a butler with peculiar habits and ideas, turn the situation into a more complicated pattern than any jig-saw puzzle.

This play, the first original play ever presented by the Ravinia Players, was written by Guernsey LePelley, president of the group for the past two years.

The workshop of the Players will present a condensed version of "Empress Jones" Tuesday evening at 8 o'clock. The soliloquy of the emperor in the forest will be acted and the rest of the play will be read. This is the play, and one of the best scenes, which has been one of Lawrence Tibbett's outstanding productions. The public is invited to attend, and the entire performance is free. This Workshop production is an attempt to give the people of Highland Park famous scenes and short plays as dramatic entertainment at no cost.

## EAST CHICAGO TEAM HERE NEXT SUNDAY

Young Men's Club Will Tackle Season's Toughest Opponent

The Highland Park Young Men's Club undefeated football team will meet the East Chicago Gophers here next Sunday afternoon.

The East Chicago aggregation, undefeated in four contests this season, stand out as possible victors in next Sunday's encounter. They have met and defeated the Harvey Yellows, 16-0, and conquered the Cicero Boosters, 13-0, the same team that the Highland Park group beat 22-0. Then the colored All-Stars fell by the wayside, 26-0, in a very one-sided battle. The strong Fullman Panthers proved to be the Gophers' only stumbling block, holding them to a 12-12 tie.

This team comes from the same territory that Fred Gilles, Highland Park Young Men's Club coach, hails from and makes his trips three times a week. According to Coach Gilles, the Gophers will supply plenty of the opposition needed by the Young Men's Club in their games. They have as members of the organization five former Indiana University players as well as a number of others from such schools as St. Louis University, Detroit University, Oglethorpe University, and North Central College.

Chuck Bennett in Backfield Led by the former University of Indiana star, Chuck Bennett, the Gophers have a fast and powerful combination. Chuck, several years back, was voted All-Conference half back and also most valuable player on his team. The others in the back field are: quarterback, Opansik, University of Indiana; Sulski, also of Indiana, is at halfback; and Patrick of Oglethorpe University, at fullback.

Outstanding men in the line are: Maxwell, center, of St. Louis University; Hills, end, of North Central College; and Morris and Nytu, guards, of Indiana University. The remainder of the team are members of neighboring high school teams and who are from all reports, as good as the college stars on the team.

Highland Park Strengthened The Highland Park club will use the same lineup that appeared in previous contests, with the exception of one or two alterations. "Hook" Kress will not be back at the center position. His place is taken by George Schwabach. Bill Lutz, whose nose was broken last Sunday when he was tackled by the huge Gansberg, will be out for several weeks. His substitute is undecided.

In the line the Highland Park team has added another member to its long list. This is Dick Hall, a huge 260-pound guard, who during his college days played football with the famed Red Grange at the University of Illinois. Later Hall went on in the football field and played two years with the New York Giants. Hall's services will be greatly needed now that the fighting "Hook" Kress has gone. Kress is in the east on the coast where he has a position with a large firm.

The Highland Park Band, under direction of Mevin Moon, will be on hand at the game to liven the crowd next Sunday. This band has appeared in and around town for the past several weeks.
