Requirements
Articles of handicraft accepted for this badge must show some degree of skill in the making and also beauty in proportion, color and simple design. Articles must be carefully and satisfactorily finished. Girl Scouts are urged to present, in so far as they can, pieces of craft work that they can use—such as gifts, troop or camp equipment, articles helpful in other badge work, personal and home accessories. Honest effort should be commended and encouraged.

1. Make and submit four completed pieces of handicraft in any one craft showing decided improvement and progress in the use of design, proportion, and suitability of craft to the article.

2. Make and submit one article or in each of four different crafts, if possible, one in natural materials.

3. Begin one piece of handicraft in the presence of the examiner to show preparation and use of materials and tools; technique; putting away of materials. Let examiner choose this demonstration a "craft in progress" and the candidate has presented a finished article.

4. Present three of four simple sketches showing the source and development of an original design.

Types of Handicraft are: natural materials, wood, paper, cord, basketry, weaving, modeling, leather, metal and textiles and needlework.

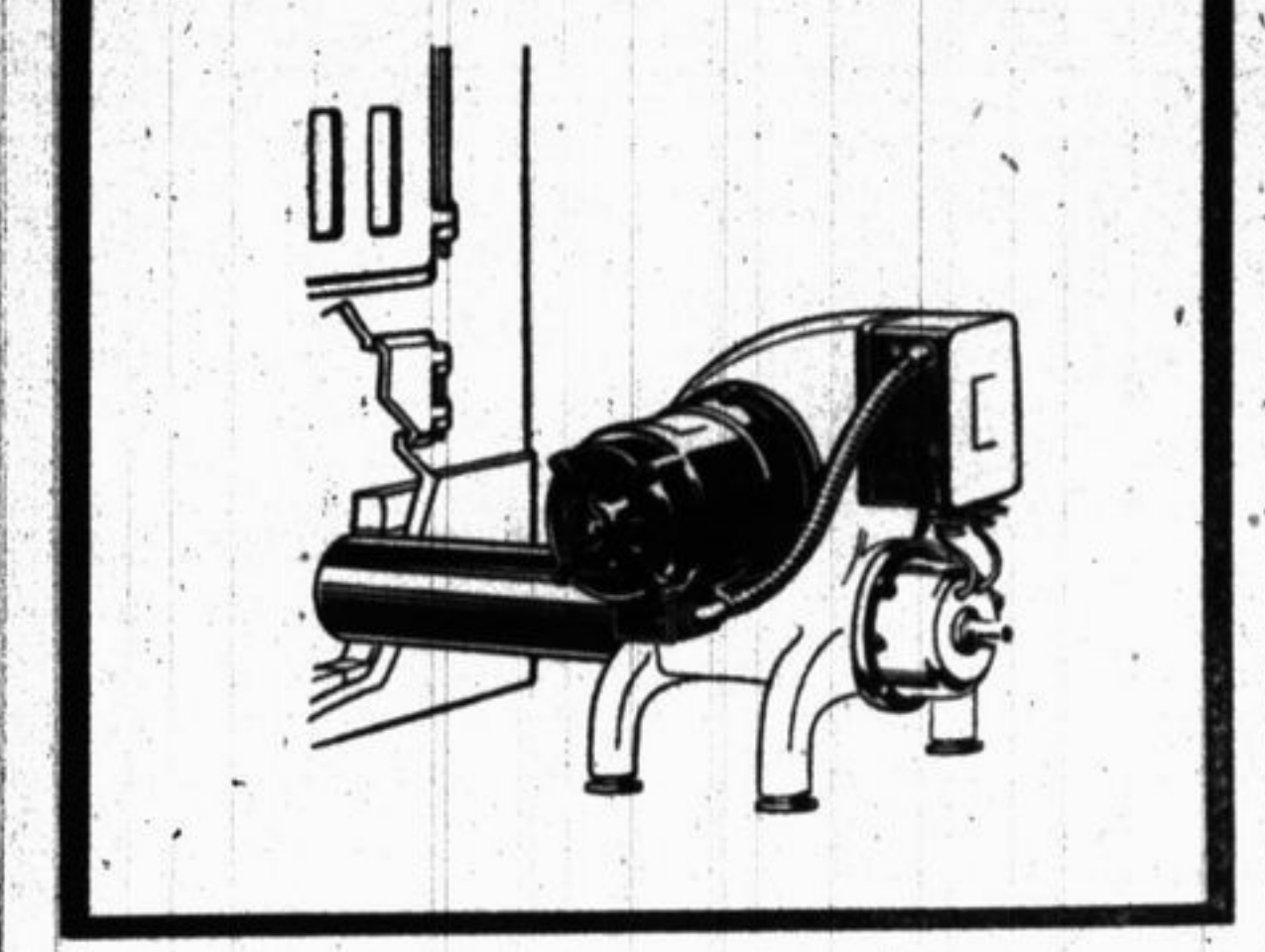

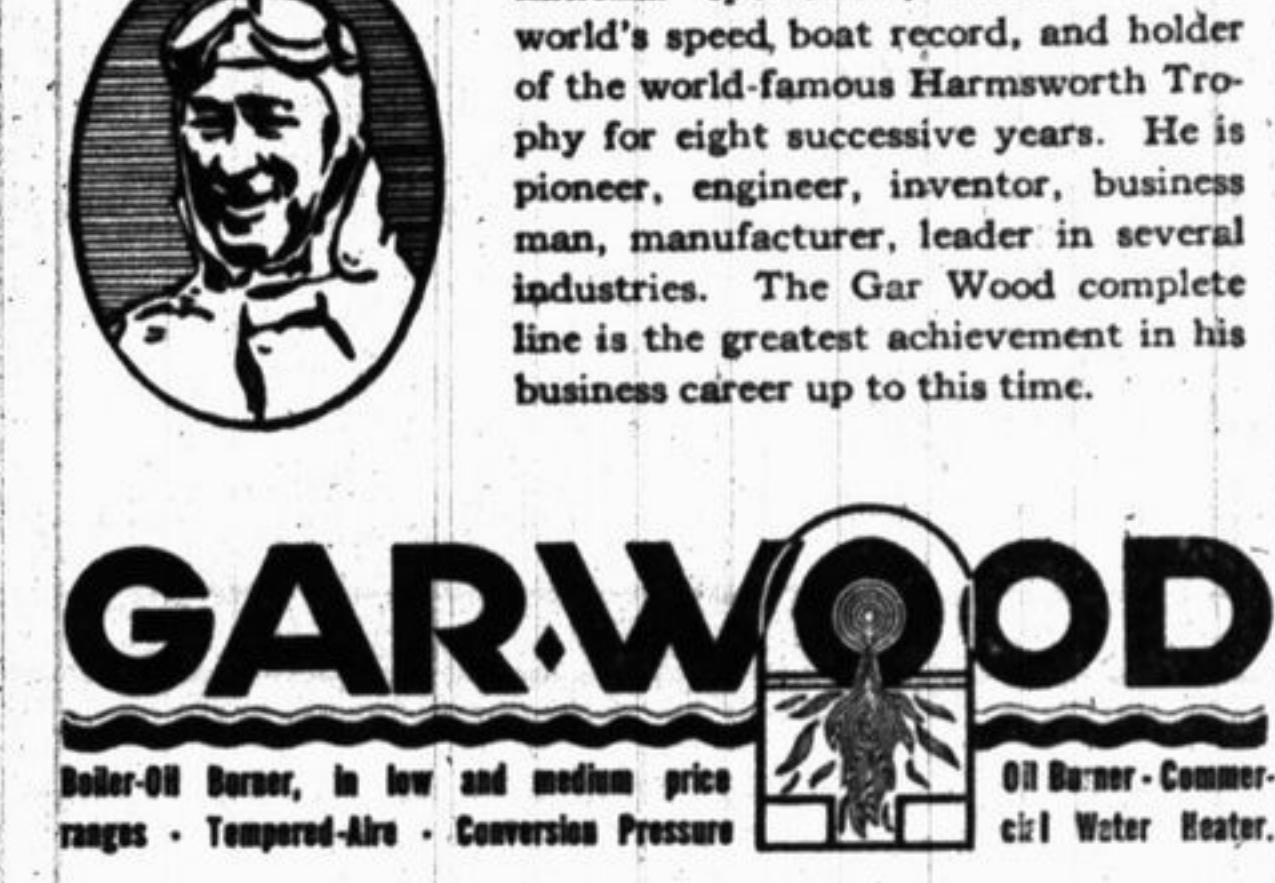
