### Deerfield Rotarians Hear Capt. Shanahan

"The Navy" was the topic chosen by Captain Shanahan of the Citizen Conservation Corps, when he spoke at the Deerfield Rotary Club last Thursday noon. He had a wealth of information gathered from 27 years in the navy and his talk was deeply interesting. A local man, E. G. Jacobson, who knew Capt. Shanahan while serving in the navy, was one of the guests. W. K. Hout, acting Rotarian of the day, introduced the speaker who is now stationed in the Skokie Reforestation Camp.

The previous week, E. B. Jordan had charge of the meeting. He kept his audience bubbling with laughter when he read excerpts from a book of the Metropolitan Area of Chicago in 1860. "The Pinion," the weekly Rotary publication, tells this of Mr. Jordan's talk:

"The program: Ted Jordan was Rotarian of the day. He gave us a glimpse of the metropolitan area of Chicago in 1860. He read excerpts from an old business directory of that period. Included was a resume of the real estate situation. Only the date would keep one from thinking that it was current comment. The portion that aroused the most interest was that part regarding Evanston. If the old foginess of the place could be substituted for a little more of the element of young Americanism, which we conceive to be no more or less than a proper principle of go-ahead-iveness, the town might become an important watering place." Another interesting part of the directory predicted the dying out of Northwestern University because of lack of funds and proper foresightedness of its president and board of trustees. At the same time it was predicted that the present Lake Forest College would be the principal seat of learning in this district. Loyala, the University of Chicago, etc., were not even mentioned. There were eighteen schools well handled by both male and female employees in Chicago at that time."

### Armistice Day Is Red Letter Day on Legion Calendar

Members of Dumaresq Spencer Post No. 145 of the American Legion and the Legion Auxiliary will assemble at the base of the flag staff, corner of Central and St. Johns Avenue, on Saturday morning, Nov. 11, to hold the annual Armistice Day observance in its city.

This ceremony will start promptly at 10:45 and will not last over fifteen minutes. At 11 o'clock sharp the one-minute silence period will be observed, after which taps will be sounded and the assembly dismissed.

The officers of the two organizations say, "We are asking the people of our community to assemble with us and take part in this brief ceremony in memory of those comrades who made the supreme sacrifice and are now sleeping in Flanders fields. It is, we feel, the least we can do, in devoting just a short time to pay our respects and in so doing help to keep alight the fires of patriotism within this land of ours."

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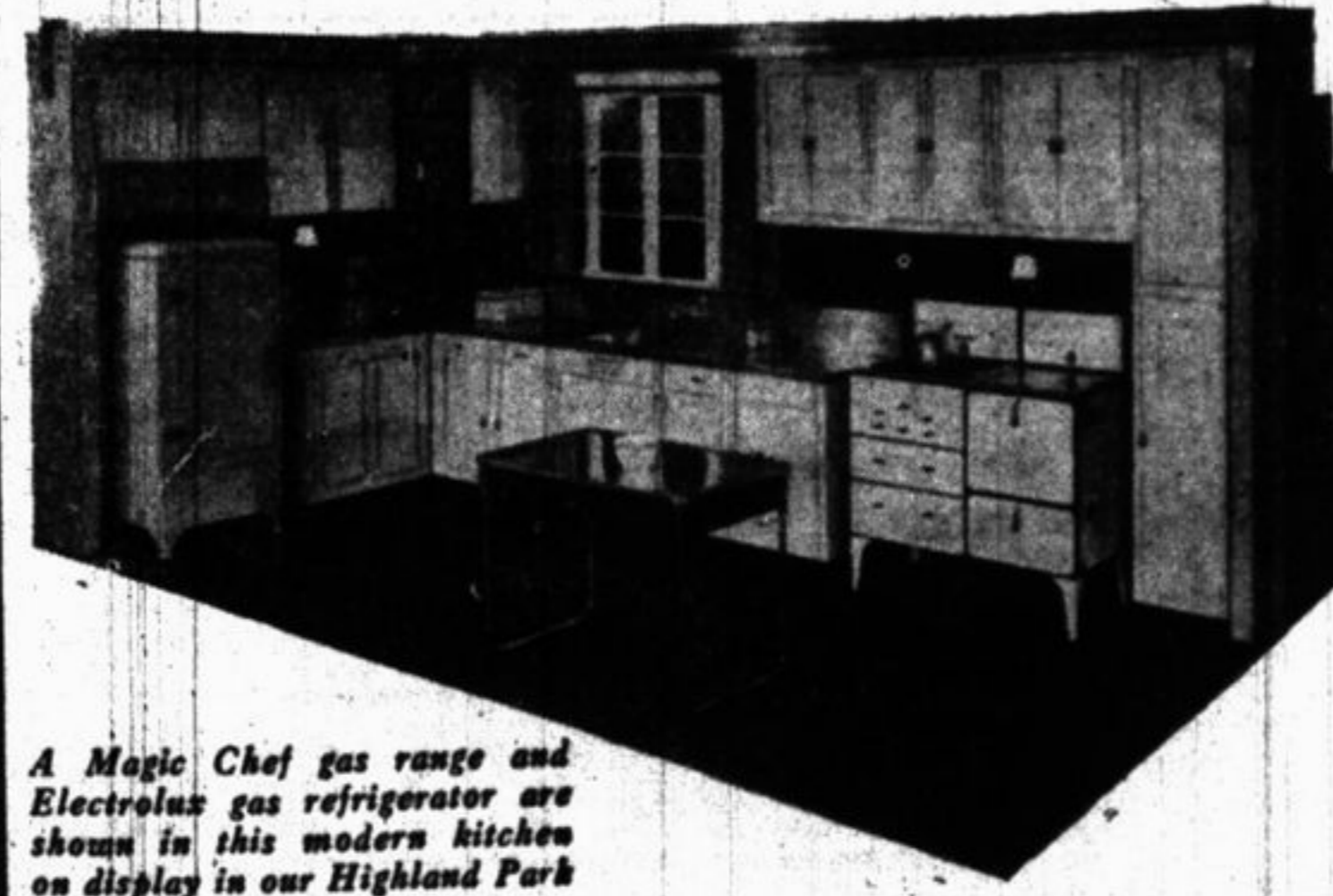
