Cubism and Futurism Discussed at Ravinia by Mrs. George Kuh

Apparently the French impressionists of the late 19th century made the first break from a factual subject to abstract painting. Futurism (which lasted only a couple of years 1910 -12) -aimed to "present successive events simultaneously, thus representing motion rather than subject." A reaction has already set in, indicating that art, like history, goes in cycles.






