63 Members Attend Meeting Of Chamber Of Commerce Tuesday

Sixty-three members and three guests were present at the November meeting of the Highland Park Chamber of Commerce, which was held Tuesday evening at the Green Tea Pot.

James Simpson, Jr., representative in Congress for the tenth district, was to have been the speaker of the evening, but important legislation demanded his unexpected appearance at Washington, D.C., and Mr. Simpson sent to the members his regrets.

The applications for membership in the Chamber of Commerce of the North Shore Motors and the Unique North Shore Cleaners were read and accepted. Other applications were read for the first time and will be presented at the December meeting for final action.

Communications regarding the proposed post office building here were read from Senator J. Hamilton Lewis, Congressman Simpson, the assistant secretary of the treasury and the assistant postmaster general.

Mayor E. V. Macogni, of Highwood, reported the progress made by his committee in securing the extension of Railway Avenue, Highwood, north to the Lake Forest city limits.

The retailers' occupation tax, in respect to the allowance or disallowance by the merchant in passing the tax on to the consumer as an added expense, was discussed in detail. It was the consensus of opinion that merchants must pass the tax on either as an added item or increased purchasing price.

It was voted to ask the state highway to erect signs at the intersection of the new Route 57 and Deerfield Road, pointing out the Highland Park business district.

Basketball League to Be Organized in H. P.

Plans are now progressing at the Highland Park Community Center for a basketball league. This league according to present plans is to be composed of six or eight teams from this community, the members of the teams being boys of high school age. Games will be played on Tuesday and Thursday nights of each week at the Community Center.

Cleaning and Dyeing Code In Effect Nov. 20

After years of faithful effort on the part of the cleaners and dyers throughout the country to eliminate the racketeering disturbance and unfair practices which have been a source of terror to all concerned, namely, the plant owner, the employee, and the consumer, the cleaners and dyers announce that all this has been terminated with the signing of their code as approved by the NRA governing the industry becoming effective Nov. 20, 1938.

"The consumer at all times has had the first consideration during the completion of this code. In your behalf minimum standards of quality and service were provided for in the proposed code at the request of Dr. Pauline Beery Mack, representing the American Home Economics Association," we are told.

"One of the greatest problems which all industry has had to face has been the question of child labor. In order that the cleaning and dyeing industry might do its part to eliminate this practice, the code has provided that no one under the age of 17 years shall be permitted to work in a dry cleaning plant. This is a distinctly social contribution to the program of general public wel-

fare, sponsored by every industry. "We unanimously concur with President Roosevelt and the National Administration in the efforts they are making to restore buying power in the United States, and earnestly seek your co-operation. It is only by recognizing the necessity for social as well as economic progress that full effect can be given this policy. Selfish interests and unscrupulous methods will no longer be tolerated."
