Miss Cornell, who is slight, fair, and delicately graceful, finds in her partner, who is dark, exotic, and almost electrically lithe, an incomparable foil. With their well trained bodies — Miss Cornell has studied with the great Laban, with Wigman and Cecchetti, and Mr. Graff has studied with Kreutzberg and other famous European teachers — they are capable of carrying out their fascinating ideas with finish. While the modern mode for sharp movement is apparent in many of their dances, it is softened by their love of the romantic and the lyric.

George Seaberg will accompany the dancers at the piano, as well as appear in his own right as a soloist. His rise to the front rank of our younger group of pianists during the past few years has been steady, predicting that his talent is reliable, well-founded, and that his musicianship is above the ordinary. His programs are always varied, comprehensive and brilliant.

John MacGregor Adams, founder of the Adams-Westlake Company, an early North Shore settler, built his house on the lake shore in Highland Park in the early 90's. Charles G. Rosenow Dies Here Thursday, Nov. 9, At Age of 75

Charles G. Rosenow, of Highland Park, died at his home Thursday of last week, Nov. 9. Funeral services were held at two o'clock Sunday afternoon from the home at 149 South Green Bay Road. Burial was in St. Peter's Cemetery, at Northbrook.

Mr. Rosenow was born in Northfield, Ill., on March 16, 1858. St. Peter's Church at Northbrook was his home church — he was baptized and married there. On April 4, 1883, he married Miss Minnie Neubauer of Chicago. They made their home in Evanston, where Mr. Rosenow entered business. While there he was a charter member of St. John's Church, in which he was active until he came to Highland Park.

Here again he became a charter member of St. John's Evangelical Church, and remained a member until his death. Mrs. Rosenow preceded him in death about two months ago.

He is survived by a son, Charles, of Denver, Colo.; a daughter, Elsie; and three sisters, Mrs. F. Ahrens, of Highland Park, Mrs. J. Bremer, of Highland Park, and Mrs. F. Holste, of Wilmette.

He had attained the age of 75 years, 7 months, and 23 days at the time of his death.

Hoops and Company to Liquidate Stock

After forty years in business in Chicago William H. Hoops & Company are at last forced to liquidate. For years the senior Mr. Hoops collected art creations from all over the world, until he had gathered together an exhibit of tapestries, porcelain, bronzes, and antique furniture that is probably the largest and most exclusive in the United States.

The trustees are disposing of this \$75,000 stock of art treasures by having the International Art Distributors sell it at a sacrifice for the benefit of the creditors. Many a prize antique long wanted by connoisseurs around Chicago can now be secured by them practically at their own price.
