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Deerfield Bldg. & Loan Has Annual Meeting

The Deerfield Building & Loan Association at its annual meeting re-elected the following officers for the ensuing year:

The annual statement showed that shareholders' profits amounted to approximately ten per cent for the last year.

One of the outstanding points in favor of building and loan associations is the fact that not one such association in Illinois has gone under during this depression, proving their stability and safety.

The Deerfield Building and Loan shares can be purchased for fifty cents a share per month; in other words, by paying into the association approximately \$66.00 over a period of eleven years, one hundred dollars will be received at the end of the period, with \$34 representing accrued profits. A shareholder also has the right to borrow the full amount he has paid into the association at any time he wishes.

The Deerfield association also issues what is known as paid-up stock in \$100 denominations bearing five percent interest from the day received until withdrawal. This interest is paid twice yearly and stock has an indefinite due date, as it can be withdrawn at any time.

The Deerfield Building and Loan Association is recognized as one of the community's greatest assets, as members save money together, loan their money to each other, and divide the profits with each other.

The public is invited to attend the meetings which are held in Vant & Selig's real estate offices every second Monday evening of the month. They are also invited to ask questions pertaining to this organization.

Wm. Steffes Replaces Oscar Rommel at P. O.

William Steffes has been appointed by the U. S. Government as mail carrier for the Deerfield post office to replace Oscar Rommel who has held that position for 28 years. Mr. Rommel has been very efficient in his work of transporting the mail bags from the depot to the Deerfield postoffice.

At intervals, the government asks for bids for the transporting of the mails, and Mr. Steffes was the lowest bidder. Mr. Steffes, who is a Spanish War veteran, has resided here for over twenty years. He began his new duties November 11. Had Mr. Rommel continued until December, he would have served exactly 28 years.

Mr. Rommel's record is quite an achievement, never having missed a day in all those years.

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Former Deerfield Woman Is Honored

The erection of a permanent memorial in Teheran, Persia, to commemorate the courageous faith of Mrs. Keith Ransom-Kehler, the second American Baha'i to die in Teheran while serving the cause, is to be carried out by the National Assembly of Baha'is of the United States and Canada, stated an article in the Sunday Tribune.

This was reported last week by the assembly, following the receipt of the news that Mrs. Ransom-Kehler, formerly of Deerfield and Chicago, had died in Teheran on Oct. 25, following two years of travel devoted to Baha'i teaching and later to seeking the removal of the ban on the entry of Baha'i literature into Persia, the country where the world religion originated.

Mrs. Ransom-Kehler has obtained from the court minister the promise that the ban would be lifted, but when the promise remained unfulfilled, she devoted the last few months of her life to the task of penetrating the imperial entourage and presenting to the shah in person a formal petition prepared by the American Assembly of Baha'is.

Mrs. Keith Ransom-Kehler was the widow of James Howard Kehler and they owned the Deer Lick Farm across from the Briergate Golf Club, now the Gauntlett property. She is survived by a daughter by a former marriage, Julia Keith Ransom.

Deerfield Bank Pays Depositors in Full

A fifty percent payment by the Citizen's State Bank of Deerfield was announced November 8 by the receiver, George F. Cardy. The dividend to this bank's depositors amounted to \$10,000 and together with a fifty percent payment made December 1932, covers all the deposit obligations of that institution.

The bank closed June 20, 1932. In seventeen months time with the full co-operation of both the closed Citizen's Bank and the Deerfield State Bank, the receiver, Mr. Cardy, was able to accomplish this 100 per cent payment.

After a very complicated real estate maneuver, covering a period of nine months, Mr. Cardy negotiated the selling of the building to a syndicate organized in the village and composed almost entirely of the directors of the Deerfield State Bank. Rudolph Lauer, president of the State Bank, heads the syndicate.

Mr. Cardy explained that this bank's liquidation was made possible especially through the efforts of Dr. Walter Metcalf and J. R. Waller, former president and largest stockholder in the bank.

This bank is the first bank in Lake County and the second in the state of Illinois to pay off (out of its assets) 100 per cent through a receiver during the depression.

The directors of this bank, whose charter has now been cancelled, spoke very highly of the work of the receiver, and his untiring efforts in helping them reach their goal. Mr. Cardy praised the directors and stated that they were deserving of much credit for having made good.

Local men who were directors in this bank are Harry Wing, Morgan Cartier, and Dr. W. B. Metcalf. The others are J. L. Walker, E. K. Butler, H. M. Cornell.
