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National Book Week

"Book Week is now almost fifteen years old, but it has already come of age and made a permanent place for itself on the calendar," says Doris S. Patee, in an article which appeared in the Publishers' Weekly for October 21. She continues, "last year in November over 10,000 schools planned book projects for class programs; over 5,000 libraries arranged special book displays; more than 500 parent-teacher associations, women's clubs, child study groups, Boy and Girl Scouts and other organizations devoted their November meetings to the discussion of children's reading. Book Week programs were broadcast over three nationwide radio hook-ups. Is there any question that all such publicity has made the public, young and old, more book conscious?"

This year National Book Week will be observed from November 12 to 18 inclusive, the theme being: Grow up with books; add a shelf for every year. The library devoted the entire evening of November 13 to children's books. Miss Jessie Gay Van Cleve, specialist in children's literature with the American Library Association in Chicago, spoke on the recent books that have been published for boys and girls.

Picture Story Books Powder—Averill and Stanley. Fascinating pictures illustrate this story, which tells how Powder, the white colt, ran away and joined the circus.

The Handsome Donkey—Davis. A delightful story of Italy. Steam Shovel For Me!—Edelstat. The illustrations and text tell what steam is, how it works and describe the machines it moves.

Story About Ping—Flack. An enjoyable nursery tale, with pictures full of life and color, about a Peking duckling whose home was aboard a houseboat on the Yangtze river.

The A B C Bunny—Gag. The doings of a sprightly bunny sweep through the pages with a rhythm which is evident in the accompanying rimed alphabet.

Spunky—Hader. Story of a white Shetland pony who had many adventures.

Johnny-Cake—Jacobs. The old and well-loved story is made doubly entertaining by the engaging pictures, graphic and full of action.

Get-a-way and Harry Janos—Petersham. This story takes place in a far-off land where old toys become new and gay.

Blue Barns—Sewell. A delightful picture story book that tells about

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and economic history of her generation. Franklin Delano Roosevelt—Mosca. A very creditable biography of the man whom the author calls "The minute man of '33."

Peter Duck—Ransome. A story in which some present day English children have exciting adventures when they go to sea aboard the Wild Cat, with Peter Duck, an ancient seaman, a member of the crew.

Amarantha Gay, M.D.—Sterne. An ambitious southern girl of the 70's seeks higher education and finds her family.

Where Is Adelaide?—White. Almost every chapter begins with that question because this little girl was always on the go and doing unexpected things.
