**Legion Returns Sum Of \$50,000 To State**

The impossible has happened — somebody has returned money to the taxpayers of Illinois! Officers of the 1933 Corporation of the American Legion, the group that sponsored the national convention in Chicago, returned to the state of Illinois intact the \$50,000 appropriation for the convention by the Illinois legislature. This is the first time in the history of the state, since it came into being in 1818, that any money voted by the general assembly for any purpose whatsoever has been repaid in whole or in part. Due to the splendid efficiency of all committees which managed the convention, this appropriation was not needed, and in addition to this amount, the state gained several thousand dollars more in taxes on the \$20,000,000.00 in new business brought to the community by the convention. It is the hope of the Legion that this returned money will be used for charity during the approaching winter.

We are informed that Illinois is leading the nation in Legion memberships, and it looks as though Dumaresq Spencer Post of Highland Park will be the "top notcher" in the state with the start they have for 1934. Whereas in other years on this date the usual total of paid-up memberships for the coming year has been about a dozen, this year to date there are well over one hundred, many of whom are new members.—Contributed.
