

**County Council of the Legion Meets Nov. 17**

The November meeting of the 8th District and Lake County Council of the American Legion was held in the Masonic Temple, Deerfield, Friday evening, Nov. 17.

Commander Henry Foval, of Lake Bluff, announced there were 110 percent more paid-up members than there were this time last year.

Committee work is well under way, several of the groups functioning efficiently at this time.

A committee was appointed to study the contract of the Department of Illinois with a Legionnaire publisher, as a means of arriving at a solution for the continuation of the Lake County Legionnaire, a monthly publication, sponsored by the Lake County Council and edited by Dan Hunt of Deerfield.

Dr. A. J. Rissinger, medical surgeon of the district, spoke on the inequalities of the examining boards of the Veterans Bureau, and the necessity of every Legionnaire understanding the methods now practiced in order that these inequalities shall be corrected. His statements were enthusiastically received by the hundred delegates and post members attending the meeting.
