#### Former Deerfield Man Dies in South Bend

Charles J. Allardt, aged 64 years, passed away Sunday at his home in South Bend, Ind. Funeral services were held Tuesday at the home and on Wednesday at the Graceland Chapel in Chicago.

Mr. Allardt was born in Picqua, Ohio, a son of Rev. and Mrs. J. W. Allardt and moved to Deerfield when five years of age. His father was pastor of the St. Paul's Evangelical Church from 1875 to 1891.

Charles Allardt, known as Carl in this vicinity, left Deerfield many years ago. He has been commissioner of public works in South Bend, manager of a hotel, and was Democratic state representative of St. Joseph County, Ind., at the time of his death.

Surviving Mr. Allardt are his widow, Mrs. Helen Cruickshank Allardt; a son, Joseph; a daughter, Jane; one brother, Henry J. Allardt of Chicago; and a sister, Mrs. Josephine Rommel of Deerfield.

### Lt. Cooper Speaks on "Reforestation" Nov. 14

The Deerfield Woman's Club provided its members with a most instructive program Tuesday afternoon Nov. 14 at the club room in the Deerfield Crammar School. Mrs. M. O. Hopkins was chairman of the program and presented Lt. F. C. Cooper of Fort Sheridan who spoke on "Reforestation."

Lt. Cooper gave the principle reasons for the organization of the Civilian Conservation Corps. It was a project to provide work for direct relief; to keep idle youths and young men off of the streets; to teach them cleanliness, morality and usefulness as well as creating the project of Reforestation which does not merely mean the planting of trees but provides for construction of roads and the fighting of forest fires as well.

Young men from the age of 18 to 24 years may enlist but must be recommended by a Relief Organization with a certificate from the Department of Labor before they are accepted at an army camp where they are drilled before they are sent to their various assignments. The men receive \$30 a month, \$25 of which is sent to their families, and the pay is graduated when a higher ranking is received. They are allowed to re-enroll after the six months have passed but are encouraged to receive employment for which an honorable discharge is received.

Stockholders of Deerfield State Bank will hold a special meeting Dec. 8, at 8 p.m., in the directors' room of the bank. This bank will be celebrating its thirteenth anniversary in December.
