

Deerfield C of C Acts on Question of Its Share in Relief Work

At a meeting of the Deerfield Chamber of Commerce held at the private dining room of Shugrue's Restaurant Friday evening, Nov. 24, Mr. Meyers raised the question that Deerfield was not getting its proper share of idle citizens placed on the payroll for local improvements to be financed with money allotted Lake County for that purpose.

A resolution was then passed requesting the president to appoint a committee of three to consult with Mayor Clavey and Supervisor O'Connor to learn if any assistance could be given them by the chamber of commerce for the purpose of aiding in procuring for Deerfield its proper recognition.

President Bickford appointed Ed Selig, Fred Meyers and Marshall A. Pottenger as the committee. This committee met early the next morning and recommended that a special meeting of the chamber be called.

Refreshments were served at both meetings and the chamber by resolution voted to continue holding its regular meetings at the restaurant. The time being changed from 8 to 7 o'clock.

Mrs. Henry Meyer Dies Funeral Held Sunday

Mrs. Henry Meyer, aged 64 years, passed away Thursday, Nov. 23, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Geo. Sticken Sr., in Deerfield. Funeral services were held Sunday afternoon at the St. Paul's Evangelical Church with Rev. F. G. Piepenbrock officiating.

Mrs. Meyer was born Nov. 17, 1869 in Labehn, Germany as Ernestine Pioch. Her childhood and youth were spent in Germany. At the age of 22 she came to America. The following year she married Henry Meyer and they moved to Deerfield where they have lived the rest of their lives.

Surviving Mrs. Meyer are five children Annie (Mrs. John Lockman of Crystal Lake); Mamie (Mrs. Geo. Sticken Sr.) and Albert Meyer of Deerfield; Marie (Mrs. Irwin Baumhardt) of Niles Center and Edith (Mrs. William White) of Chicago.

A sister, Mrs. Frank Sack, of Deerfield, and fifteen grandchildren also survive.
