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**Change in Banking Hours**

Rules and regulations adopted by Group Three of the Illinois Bankers Association, on Friday, November 17th, in accordance with the NRA National Banking Code, limit the period during which banking institutions may keep their doors open for the purpose of serving the public, to thirty-six hours weekly.

The adopted schedule gives our patrons the full benefit of the allotted time, does not vary in any great extent to the one now in operation, and fixes the hours on and after December 4th, 1933, as follows:

**8:00 A.M. to 2:15 P.M.**  
**Saturdays 8:00 A.M. to 12:45 P.M.**
