### 500 TO REPRESENT SUBURBAN SCHOOLS IN MEETING HERE

TO BE HELD APRIL 14  
 Competition For Original Songs and Cover Designs Being Held

The Suburban League Girls Club Conference is to be held at Deerfield-Shields on April 14, 1934. Nineteen schools in the territory extending as far north as Waukegan, west to Aurora, south to Chicago Heights, and south-west to Calumet City, are to be represented.

**Vacations To Be Discussed**  
 The purpose of these annual meetings is to acquaint the girls with all kinds of problems concerning ideals, vacations, and the welfare of girls, nationally and internationally. This is accomplished by engaging persons of international renown as the speakers.

The theme for last year's conference was "Internationalism" and this year it is to be "Ideals, Future, and Happiness of Girls."

Since this is to be an all-day affair and the number of delegates will be near to five hundred, the sessions are to be held in the auditorium. Later in the day tours are to be conducted through the buildings to show our school to the visitors. A luncheon, under Mrs. Wrights supervision, will be served in the school cafeteria.

**Number of Delegates Limited**  
 Each high school will be allowed to send one girl for every thirty-six registered there. Deerfield is permitted to have 22 representatives, which is fortunate, since there are exactly 22 girls' sessions in school. The various schools are taking charge of the different parts of the program which are the selection of a speaker, songs, program cover designs, resolutions, quota, hostess and sociability.

**Competitions Held**  
 Each year there is an interesting bit of competition connected with these conferences, since students from the different schools submit original songs and cover designs to the judges in hope of bringing recognition to their particular school. For the last four successive years Deerfield has had the good fortune to win the cover design contest. Last year Ruth Anderson, who is now attending the Chicago Art Institute, submitted the most appropriate design.
