**Local Gas Company One of the Largest**  
Statistics published recently by Brown's Directory of American Gas Companies indicates that the North Shore Gas Company which serves this district is exceeded in size by only five gas distribution systems in the entire state. Compared with the fifty other companies reporting outside of Chicago, it is slightly more than three times the average size on a basis of number of meters installed.

Due to the relatively low density of population in the territory served, the company has an unusually high investment ratio for miles of street mains per 1,000 customers. In the North Shore district, more than twenty miles of street mains are required for each thousand customers, whereas, in Chicago, less than five miles of mains are needed.

Local gas company officials point out that the statistics, as published, indicate that the company is large enough to permit economical manufacture and distribution and, at the same time, small enough to permit close supervision and efficient management.
