Lydia Hastings, from Mrs. Kendig's session, will take charge of those baskets that cannot be delivered by the girls' sessions.

Give Clothing and Toys
Besides the baskets of food, many of the sessions are giving the children toys and books. They are also bringing any clothing that they or their sisters and brothers have outgrown. A few sessions are decorating Christmas trees and presenting them to the families.

On the average there are three or four children in each family. A few families have as many as eight or nine children, most of them being under fifteen years of age. Some are without mothers or fathers.

The baskets should be all ready for delivery, except the perishable foods, by today.
