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North Western Road Will Cut Round-Trip Fares Again Jan. 2

The New Year of 1934 will introduce new 1.8 cents per mile each way daily round-trip coach tickets on the Chicago & North Western Railway—a 50 per cent reduction over the rate of 3.6 that was in effect up until Nov. 30 and a 10 per cent reduction over the 2 cent basic rate that has been in effect since Dec. 1. This new round-trip coach rate will go into effect Jan. 2, the tickets having a ten-day return limit.

"With the introduction of this low round-trip coach rate, which cuts in half the rates that mid-week travelers were used to during most of 1933, we expect the travel spurt that has been in evidence since the new basic rate went in effect Dec. 1 to be given added impetus," R. Thomson, passenger traffic manager, declares "Results thus far on the Chicago & North Western Railway have shown that travelers are finding that the new rail fares fit their travel purses.

"Rates from 1.8 to 3 cents a mile will be in effect after Jan. 2. For instance, (1) 1.8 cents a mile each way for round-trip coach tickets with a ten-day return limit, (2) two cents a mile for one-way coach tickets or for round-trip first-class tickets with a ten-day return limit, (3) two and one-half cents a mile for round-trip first-class tickets with a six months return limit, and (4) three cents a mile for one-way first-class tickets.

"It will be possible for patrons on the Chicago & North Western Railway to go almost everywhere in the Western and Southwestern United States any and every day at these new low fares."

Riding Classes Start At Fort Sheridan

This year's riding classes started this month at the Fort Sheridan Riding Hall, under the competent instructions of Sgt. W. Harris, and his assistant D. Schmucker, with a large enrollment. Sgt. Harris has taught classes for the last five consecutive years.

At the first meeting of the classes on December 2 the following divisions were made: beginners through the ages of four to ten were divided into two parts according to their experience; the advanced children's class, which consisted of students through the ages of ten to eighteen, were also divided in respect to their ability; and in the third class, instruction is given to ladies who are interested in riding.

Classes are conducted every Saturday and Sunday afternoons. Beginning children ride from one to

two o'clock, advanced children from two until three, and ladies from three to four o'clock.

At the present time the classes are learning the rudiments of riding, including: posture, the position of the reins, mounting and dismounting, and the different gaits of the horses.

In the spring when the classes have had more experience they will attempt to jump, starting with low hurdles and gradually increasing until they have had enough experience to take the full sized ones.

The horses and equipment are supplied by A and B troops of the 14th Cavalry, United States Army, now stationed at Fort Sheridan.

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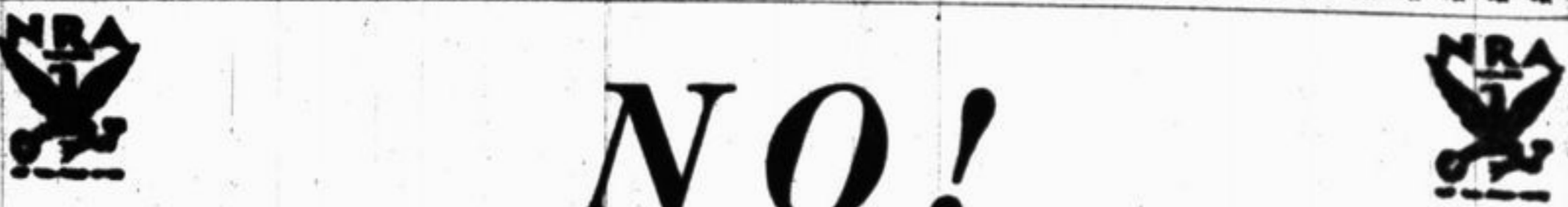


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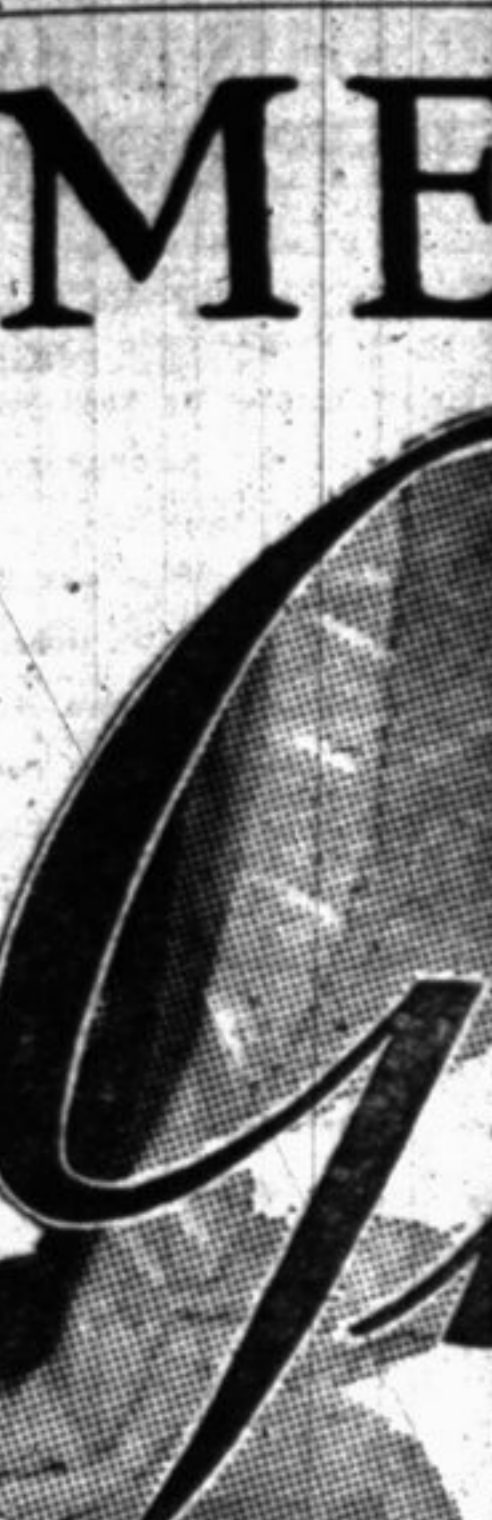
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
