No Yuletide Baskets from Deerfield Relief

The Deerfield Relief Organization will not distribute Christmas baskets this year, as has been its custom since it started to function four years ago because relief work is now being handled by the state and federal authorities and it is felt that the need is not so great.

E. H. Selig, treasurer, reported that at the annual meeting of Nov. 11, 1932, there was \$8.58 on hand and that \$137.25 was now in the treasury after disbursing over one thousand dollars during that period. The money will remain in the treasury for emergency demands.

Mrs. M. A. Pottinger, chairman of the clothing committee, reported that over \$600 in used clothing had been distributed during the past year.

Mrs. M. O. Hopkins, chairman of the Red Cross, said that only a few sweaters and stockings remained that she had sent a request in to headquarters for flour, blankets, underwear, etc. Sixty-nine families have been cared for, but unless supplies came from the Red Cross there would be little to distribute.

The request for shoes seemed the greatest and the demands could not be met.

One thousand pounds of pork was distributed in West Deerfield Township by Supervisor O'Connor. The secretary, Mrs. W. A. Tennemann, was instructed by President Pottinger to write a letter to Gerry Brothers in New York and tell them the results of the community garden plot on property, the use of which was donated by them for that purpose.

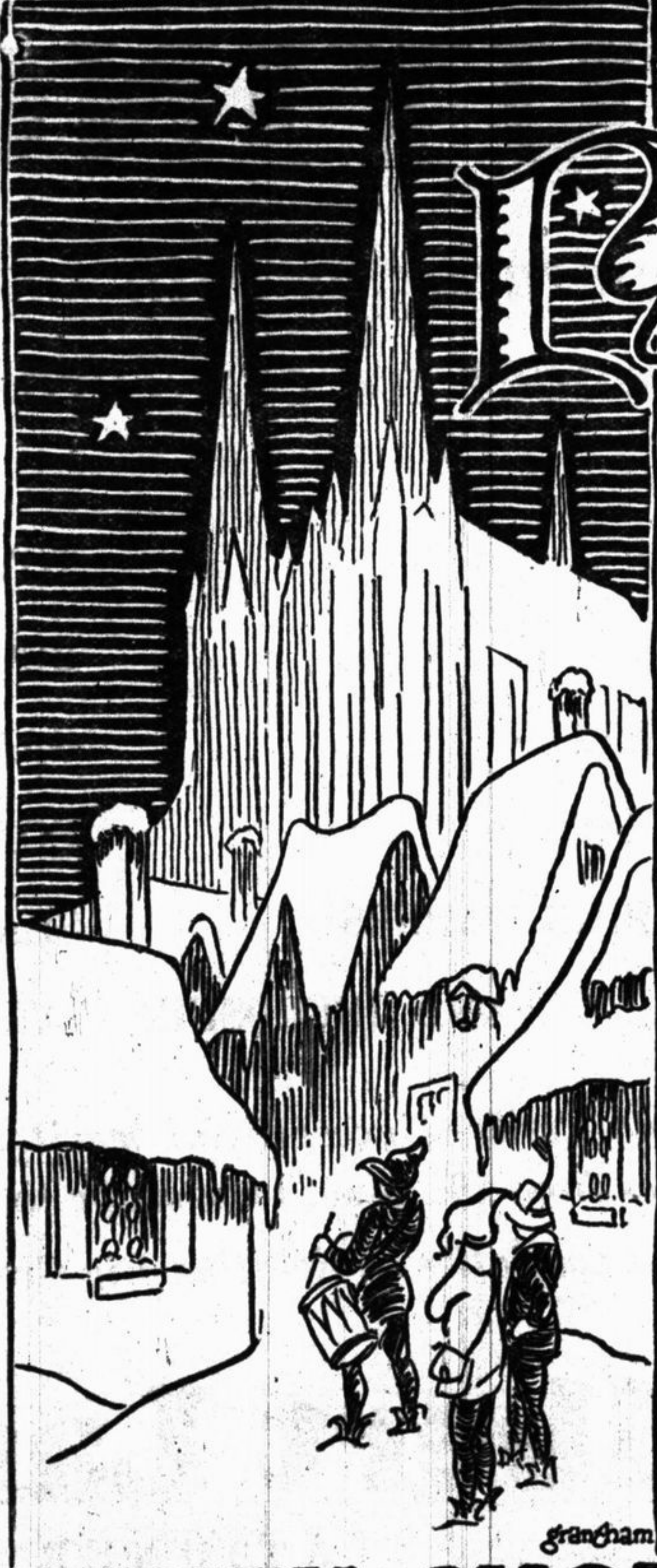
