

SCHOOL BOND ISSUE ELECTION SATURDAY

the government in pursuance of its re-employment program, and.

"Whereas, under the laws of Illinois, the high school building can be erected only after it has been approved at an election called for that purpose and the board has by resolution called such an election,

"Now, Therefore, Be It Resolved: That the board of education of the Deerfield-Shields Township High School District strongly urge the voters of said district to appear and vote for the erection of said high school building at the election to be held January 20th, 1934."

A committee of prominent citizens has the matter in hand of preparing data which will be made available to every voter and citizen in the Deerfield-Shields Township High School District, in ample time to permit a careful study of the situation before election day — next Saturday, January 20.

The proposed school will be a complete unit covering a 4-year course and will be a sister school to the

present one in Highland Park and under the same administration.

Lake Forest has wanted this school for several years, even to the extent of attempt at withdrawing from the Deerfield-Shields Township High School District when it seemed no other way offered. This happily will not be necessary and under the plans contemplated, the present high efficiency can be maintained. A separation could easily mean an impairment, excepting at a great increase in the respective budgets. And the nice part of it is financing thru government gift and long-time loan avoids an increase of any consequence in the school levy.

Efforts made during the past few months to obtain PWA funds were rewarded ten days ago when word came that our prayers were answered. A gift of about \$100,000 and 4% bonds for \$275,000 will be at our disposal — work on the building to be under way within sixty days. It is possible under the proposed plans to erect a \$350,000 school building, properly equip and man it with so small an addition to our tax bill as to mean an increase of \$1.30 on a \$100 tax bill. This increase will not be felt until the levy for 1935, by which time, let us hope, the depression is only a memory.

It is stated that should Lake Forest, in the event of a negative vote, find ways of withdrawing from the district, the increase in our school tax rate would be increased to such an extent as that each present \$100 tax bill would increase by over \$10.

Republican Service Men's League In Lake County Is Organized

Perfection of an organization of war veterans to sponsor good government and to promote the candidacies of ex-service men for state county, and municipal offices is underway today.

The organization, which is to be known as the Republican Service Men's League, named George S. McGauhey of Waukegan as temporary chairman, and V. W. Briddle of Highland Park, temporary secretary at an assembly of veterans held Sunday, Jan. 14, at Witten's Hall in Highland Park.

A board of directors will govern the policies of the league. The board will be composed of leaders from each of the 17 townships in the county, to be known as captains.

Each captain will head the subdivision of the league in the respective townships, which will be organized in a series of meetings to be held during the next two weeks.

The organization of the units of the league is to be based on military formation. The board of directors will be the ruling body or board of strategy. The captains will represent the township units with officers of lower ranks in charge of the precincts.

Promotion of service men candidates in the April 10 Primary will be the first step in the league's activities. At present only three probable candidates for county offices on the Republican ticket are veterans.

Another meeting of the entire county organization will be held on Sunday, Jan. 28, at the old town hall in Libertyville, to name permanent county officers and to complete plans for the formation of township units.

At this meeting reports on the activities of the Republican service men candidates for all county, state and municipal offices will be made.

Letters are being sent to all known Republican service men in the county, asking them to form organizations in their townships.

It is pointed out that all members of uniformed armed forces of all countries, if citizens and Republican voters, are eligible for membership in this organization.

garments for the babies and furnished volunteer workers for 95 per cent of the semi-weekly station conferences.

Alice H. Wood station furnished medical supervision and home nursing care last year to 983 infants, 630 children between the ages of two and six years, and 278 expectant mothers—a total of 1,891. The saving of infant life, while by no means the only yardstick for measuring the value of this work, is a phase of it which never ceases to hold attention. In all of its eighteen stations the Infant Welfare Society cared for 17,676 children and expectant mothers with an infant death rate of only 9 per thousand babies cared for. Alice H. Wood station had 7 deaths per thousand babies cared for.

By means of its comprehensive health program the Infant Welfare Society teaches handicapped mothers in the poorest sections of Chicago how to keep themselves and their babies well, it reduces the demand for immediate charity by preventing sickness, it upholds the morale of the families whom it serves, it increases the possibilities of usefulness in the coming generation of citizens. Highland Park-Ravinia may well take pride in the share it has had in this worthwhile work.

After the morning meeting of the Woman's Auxiliary, luncheon will be served in the Grand Ballroom of the Blackstone at 12:30 p.m., followed by the annual meeting of the whole Infant Welfare Society, Philip D. Armour, president, presiding. The speaker will be Samuel A. Goldsmith, executive director of the Jewish Charities of Chicago. Every contributor is a member of the Infant Welfare Society and is invited to attend these two meetings.
