**MISS PERKINS SEES NEW MORAL PURPOSE**

becomes now our economic purpose." She elaborated her theme by showing how immensely important to industry and business it was to have the wage-earner and farmer retain their purchasing power. Two-thirds of all goods consumed in the United States were purchased by people with incomes under \$2,000 per year. With the boost that a large, useful, and necessary building program would give to an increasing number of industries and workers, the depression may be definitely overcome.

"It will be a real self-liquidating project. It will raise not only the value of the land on which the low-cost, well-planned houses are built, but also the value of all surrounding properties," said Miss Perkins. "It will raise the standard of living in all the outlying districts as well, and, what is very important, it will raise the standard of the commercial builders."

"A project of this sort, however, requires a social survey first. Care must be taken to ascertain the wages, the number in the family, the family, the number of old people and children, the way of life, and the habits of those for which the houses are to be built. "Then a financial survey would have to be undertaken, to determine the incomes of the people, the tax needs, and the park needs of the community, etc."

"While this requires a great deal of intensive work, and while as many as nine million people are housed in dwellings unfit for human habitation, we expect that at least four million of those will be rehoused within the next two years." Care should be taken to make clear the difference between "slum clearance and low cost housing." The terms are not synonymous. There are times when the clearance and re-building of slums causes the value of the property to advance so rapidly as to raise the rent far above what the original dweller can afford to pay. In that event, he is forced to move to another slum where he can pay, which, of course, still further increases the congestion. Time and again, projects of this sort have shown the result. What may be necessary in such cases is to erect low-cost houses in a more outlying district, where the cost of investment and maintenance will not rest too heavily on the tenant.

"The Administration looks beyond business to the common man," said the Secretary of Labor, "since on him rests our whole economic basis. We have begun to see that we can't be rich unless we're all so good."

"We know that we are living in a surplus civilization instead of a deficit civilization. There is enough for everybody if everybody could afford to buy. We must build up our internal market and keep it up."

Miss Perkins emphasized the point that in the Great American Experiment in which the Administration is engaged, of trying to realize the ideal of a decent standard of living for every American

family, the people themselves have a tremendous part. "The Federal officers," she said, "must be in touch with the American people, they must hear from them. We must not allow our government to become separated from the people. We are all working together on this, and we must think out the problems of government with the government, and advise soberly on the problems of local affairs."

Everything which tends to revive the old town-meeting spirit, and the cracker box in the corner grocery store, is to be applauded and encouraged. People should have opportunities to state their own opinions, and learn what others in their community think.

"The more organizations like the League of Women Voters we have in our local communities, the more people speak their minds on this and related subjects, the closer are we to success in our experiment. We must go back to the older friendliness and keenness of interest in political affairs, which led to such fine self-government in the early days. The league is a very vital substitute for the old town-meeting."

Miss Perkins' appearance and manner surprised many of her hearers. Her simplicity and forthrightness, her tact in answering some of the questions which were entirely outside her province, made a distinct and highly favorable impression on the large number of people present.

Before her lecture she attended a dinner given her by Mr. and Mrs. Norman Meiners of Highland Park. Dr. and Mrs. John A. Lapp of Chicago and Mr. and Mrs. Marc Law were also present. Mrs. Meiners is chairman of the Finance committee, and was responsible for bringing Miss Perkins here.

be used in this project must come under the Public Works Administration legislation enacted by Congress last year. In addition to the \$275,000 and interest which must be repaid to the government by local taxpayers, there will be the cost of necessary and suitable furnishings and equipment for a school of this kind, besides a greatly increased cost in the operation of two schools.

In a statement made about six months ago by Mr. R. L. Sandwick, superintendent of the Deerfield-Shields High School, and in a pamphlet sent out over the signature of Mr. George J. McBride, president of the High School Board, it was stated that the present buildings now being used are sufficient to take care of any possible increase in enrollment for four or five years to come. In the words of Mr. McBride "why have two poor high schools at greater cost in these times when one good school suffices?" Any argument to the effect that the present high school is overcrowded is absolutely untrue.

If the meanwhile, simply because we can secure \$75,000 of "easy money" from the federal government, is no reason that additional tax burdens be now imposed upon the tax-paying public, particularly when Lake Forest contributes less than 20 per cent to our present enrollment.

According to figures recently released by the Illinois State Teachers' Association the cost per student for the year 1932-33 at Deerfield-Shields High School was \$214.70, the highest any high school in the state of Illinois!

The next highest was Cicero at \$156.70. Other neighboring high schools such as Oak Park, show a per capita cost of \$145.66 and Evanston at \$142. Why should the cost of the Deerfield-Shields High School stand out so far ahead of all the other high schools within the state?
