In a statement made about six months ago by Mr. R. L. Sandwick. superintendent of the Deerfield-Shields High School, and in a pamphlet sent out over the signature of Mr. George J. McBride, president of the High School Board, it was stated that the present buildings now being used are sufficient to take care of any possible increase in enrollment for four or five years to come. In the words of Mr. McBride "why have two poor high schools at greater cost in these times when one good school suffices?" Any argument to the effect that the present high school is overcrowded is absolutely

In the meanwhile, simply because we can secure \$75,000 of "easy money" from the federal government, is no reason that additional tax burdens be now imposed upon the taxpaying public, particularily when Lake Forest contributes less than 20 per cent to our present enroll-

According to figures recently released by the Illinois State Teachers' Association the cost per student for the year 1932-33 at Deerfield-Shields High School was \$214.70, the highest any high school in the state of Illinois!

The next highest was Cicero at \$156.70. Other neighboring high schools such as Oak Park, show a per capita cost of \$145.66 and Evanston at \$142. Why should the cost of the Deerfield-Shields High School stand out so far ahead of all the other high schools within the state?


