

Highwood Organization Elects New Officers

The Highwood Civic Improvement Association held a large and interesting meeting on Monday, Jan. 8. The meeting was held at the residence of contractor Albert E. Olson, 51 High Street, Highwood.

Many questions and items of interest were discussed, including President Roosevelt's recovery plans, Social Service, relief problems, CWA projects and general welfare.

It was the sense of the meeting that all members pledge their support to help the community in the President's plan of national recovery in a constructive manner.

This association is now in its seventh year and through its work has accomplished much for the city of Highwood and the schools, and the records show that the association has spent thousands of dollars on improvements for the school and city of Highwood benefiting the citizens and children, also donations to many good causes.

It is planned to make a drive for a thousand members this year. None of the association officers or members receive any salaries, but gladly do the work for the sake of good citizenship. The association has as its members, men of all other organizations in this community. "In fact it is the home-man, the property owner, the renter, the laborer, the mechanic and the executive, all of which gives the association talent, neighborliness and real friendship," the officers say.

The methods of raising funds for constructive work is by having minstrel shows, debates, carnivals, shows and dances.

The speakers at the last meeting were Mayor E. V. Mocogni and Rev. William Nelson.

Mayor Mocogni outlined the possibilities for this community, also the CWA projects planned for the city and the employment of labor. Mr. Mocogni also announced the birthday ball to be held in honor

of President Roosevelt's birthday to be held on Jan. 30.

Rev. Nelson gave a very interesting talk on President Roosevelt's twelve points and demonstrated the points by using a large blackboard. After Rev. Nelson finished his talk, he invited the members present to ask questions. His answers to all questions were very satisfactory.

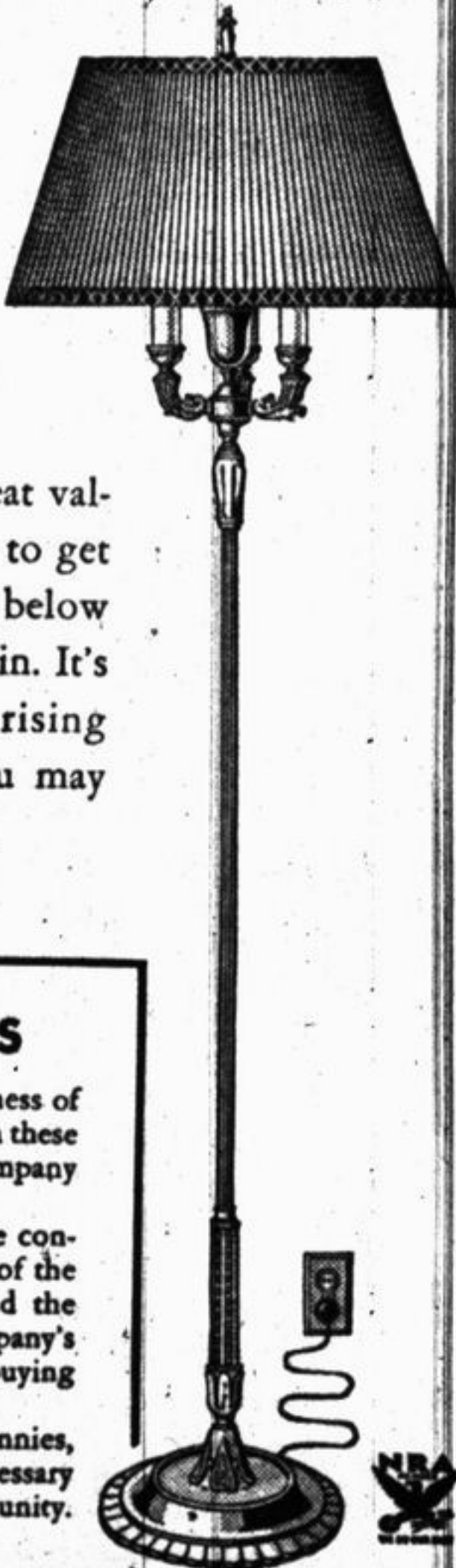
