Girl Killed When Car Hits Truck Driven by a Highland Park Man

A Wilmette girl was killed and her father seriously injured Sunday afternoon in Niles Center when their car collided with a U. S. Government truck driven by a Highland Park member of the Civilian Conservation Corps.
The victim was Charlotte Nielson, 19, the daughter of Waldemar Nielson, a civil engineer residing at 225 Fifteenth street, Wilmette.
The driver of the truck was B. E. Darnell, 211 North Avenue, Highland Park. Niles Center police investigating the crash said that the C.C.C. worker was not to blame, and did not hold him when his superior officer promised his appearance at the inquest which was scheduled for Monday morning.
According to the accident report, Mr. Nielson was driving east in Dempster Street when he attempted to make a left turn, colliding with the truck going west on Dempster. Police believed that Mr. Nielson misjudged the distance of the truck when attempting the left turn. The girl died on the way to the Saint Francis Hospital in Evanston.
