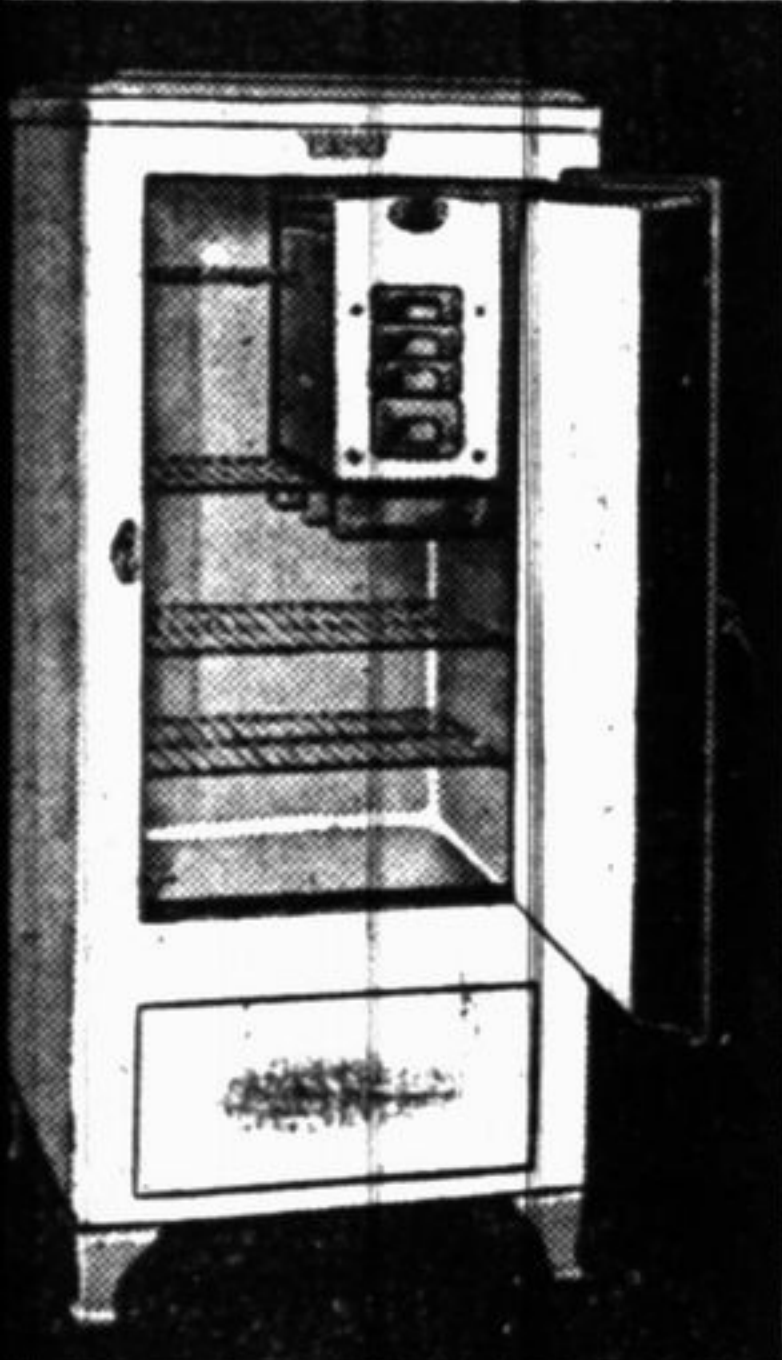

**Alleged Attacker Is
Bound to Grand Jury**

Willard Schray 45, of Milwaukee,
was bound over to Lake County
grand jury Monday by Police Magis-
trate Herman Schwery of Highland
Park, on bonds totaling \$17,500.

Schray is accused of robbing and
attempting to murder Clifford M.
Brown, 51, of Chicago, on Jan. 4.
Schray shot Mr. Brown after the
latter had given him a ride from
Milwaukee to Highland Park.

Schray waived preliminary hear-
ing Monday, apparently unwilling
to face Mr. Brown who, to the sur-
prise of his physicians, has recov-
ered sufficiently from three bullet
wounds to appear in court.

**The North Shore Line
Veterans Club to Meet**

Historical incidents and events of
the early days in north shore terri-
tory will be recalled by 58 members
of the North Shore Line Veteran
Employees' 25-Year Club when they
assemble Saturday evening, Jan. 20,
for their annual reunion and ban-
quet at the Waukegan Hotel.

The growth and development of
the communities served by the North
Shore Line since the road started
operation in 1894 will be discussed
by the veterans, many of whose ser-
vice records span almost the entire
40-year period. The club mem-
bership embraces all employees with the
company 25 years or more.

The expansion of the Bluff City
Electric Railway, fore-runner of the

North Shore Line into the present
high-speed electric interurban rail-
road, as the territory between Chi-
cago and Milwaukee was developed,
will also be reviewed by the veter-
ans. These extensions were made
in progressive stages from 1894,
when the line started operation be-
tween Waukegan and Highland
Park, to 1926, when the Skokie
Valley Route was placed in service.

J. W. Simons, superintendent of
the Waukegan City Lines, is presi-
dent of the club. Other officers are:
vice-president, William Ludwig, Mil-
waukee; secretary, Edward A. Nev-
ins, Highland Park; treasurer, Elm-
er Brown, Highland Park.

North Shore Line officials will join
with the veterans in their reunion.
Election of officers and entertain-
ment are other features which will
mark the occasion.
