Villard on Fascism

The North Shore communities enjoyed another fine opportunity and lecture given by Oswald Garrison Villard at the North Shore Congregational Israel Forum in Glencoe in Feb. 6. The subject of the talk was "Can America Avoid Fascism." Mr. Villard is the former editor of The Nation, and author of several books which are to be found in the library:

The German Phoenix. John Brown.
Some Newspapers and Newspaper Men.

There is also a short sketch of Villard's life in *Adventurous Americans*, edited by Devere Allen.

Fifteen Finest Novels
In the February issue of the Reader's Digest, one of the many new magazine additions to the library's list for this year, is a list in chronological order of the fifteen finest novels of the world as selected by William Lyon Phelps.

Robinson Crusoe (1719), by Daniel Defoe.
The first English novel and a masterpiece written when Defoe was 58.

Gulliver's Travels (1726), by Jonathan Swift
Swift was also 58 when he composed this famous satire on man.

Clarissa (1747), by Samuel Richardson
This eight volume work is a challenge to Anthony Adverse fans.

The History of Tom Jones (1749), by Henry Fielding
The hero of this novel is recognized as the natural man of all time.

Eugenie Grandet (1833), by Honore de Balzac
Acknowledged to be the author's finest work.

The Three Musketeers (1844), by Alexandre Dumas
The characters of this book should be among the intimate friends of every person in the world who is able to read.

David Copperfield (1849), by Charles Dickens
Mr. Phelps regards Dickens as the greatest English novelist because of his large contribution and because he is irreplaceable.

The Scarlet Letter (1850), by Nathaniel Hawthorne
The best book to illustrate the particular kind of art represented by the novel.

Henry Esmond (1852), by William Makepeace Thackeray
Written with zest and full of impressive scenes.

Madame Bovary (1857), by Gustave Flaubert
A book which was suppressed in France, but which Henry James said would make an admirable book for American Sunday schools.

Fathers and Children (1861), by Ivan S. Turgenev

An admirable combination of truth and beauty which brings together fathers and children.
Les Miserables (1862), by Victor Hugo
With this novel, Hugo conquered the world.

Anna Karenina (1873-1876), by Leo N. Tolstol
In Phelps' opinion, this is the greatest novel ever written.

The Brothers Karamazov (1879), by Feodor M. Dostoevski
He specializes in the abnormal.

Huckleberry Finn (1884), by Mark Twain
The authentic voice of America.

The Negro in Literature
Along This Way, by J. W. Johnson
This well written autobiography tells the story of the Negro in the United States and his struggle for recognition as an American citizen. The author is a teacher, poet, lawyer, consul, and journalist, and is best known for his collections of negro spirituals.

Roll, Jordan, Roll, by Julia Peterkin.
A delightful book about the plantation negroes of South Carolina, including seventy full-page photographs, commentary on folk ways, and stories of individual characters. Comedy: American Style, by J. R. Fauser

This is the story of a group of near-white colored people in Philadelphia, and portrays cultured Negro life seen from within. The life of one family is embittered because of the mother's determination to pass as a white person.

The American Legion is sponsoring a nation-wide contest in essay writing which is open to all Highland Park students. The subject is "Peace with Security," and the essays which must not exceed 1,000 words are to be submitted before Feb. 25. They will be judged on punctuation, grammar, neatness, originality, suitability of material, and manner of presentation. Some material on this subject will be found in the public library.

Best Sellers of 1933
Anthony Adverse is announced as the year's best-selling novel, with Walter Pitkin's Life Begins at Forty being the non-fiction leader.

The proportion of American authorship of the ten best fiction sellers has increased for 1933: John Galsworthy (English), Mazo De La Roche (Canadian), and Hans Fallada (German) are the three foreign authors. In the non-fiction list seven books are by American authors, and the trend of the times is emphasized by the publication of the many books on current affairs and politics. Of these, the best seller was President Roosevelt's book which appears in seventh place.

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able invariably started more readily with the choke out only three-quarters of the way and the throttle entirely closed. Neither blue prints nor automotive engineering training could reveal this, but only the humble process of experimenting.

Some recent models of cars are equipped with automatic choke, which naturally eliminates choke and models highly volatile gasoline, aided throttle manipulation. In these by a properly lubricated car, assumes maximum importance for winter operation. Since the automatic choke is adjusted to start the motor instantly providing the motor is turned over at a specified speed, fast starting in very cold weather cannot be realized unless the proper winter lubricants are used so as to maintain the required speed in turning over the engine.
