Judge Gutknecht feels that the crime problem in Chicago is a rather hopeless one unless the Crime Commission can be brought to a better understanding of the problems involved in the Boy's Court.

**Symposium on Japan At Ravinia Forum On Next Sunday Evening**

An illustrated symposium on Japan and the Japanese role in international affairs will be the program of the forthcoming meeting of the Ravinia Forum, on Sunday evening, Feb. 25, promptly at 7:30 o'clock, in the Ravinia Village House.

Dr. Isamu Hashiro, a Japanese resident of Chicago and a member of International House, will present a travelogue and motion-picture entitled "The Four Seasons in Japan," which will carry the observer through the picturesque highlands and rice-paddies of the Island Empire. Clark Eichelberger, now director of the American League of Nations Association, with headquarters in New York, and widely known throughout the Middle West as an able student of international affairs and an advocate of closer American collaboration with the League as the best means of realizing the solemn pledges of more than fifty nations renouncing war and binding themselves to seek the solution of any controversy that may arise, of whatever character, solely by peaceful means (the Kellogg-Briand Pact), will discuss the present situation in the Orient as viewed from Geneva and Washington, and the legal and moral position of Japan in the eyes of the organized world community.

Raymond E. Wilson, director of the Mid-West Institute of International Affairs, which meets annually, in August, at Northwestern University, and who has spent many months in Japan, as recipient of a Japanese Students' Fellowship, will discuss the threatened naval armaments race between Japan, the United States and Great Britain, and will interpret Japanese ambitions in the Far East, particularly Manchuria, as seen by various elements of Japanese public opinion.

The importance of Japan as a factor in world-politics, and the recurring rumors of war fanned by the more irresponsible and jingoist newspapers in this country, as well as in Japan, and encouraged by the armaments manufacturers and their sleepless lobbyists, makes the forthcoming program of real importance to anyone desirous of being well-informed on one of the greatest international problems of the day. The customary small admission fee will be charged in order to defray the expenses of the meeting. Children under 17 will be admitted for less. All members of the community are cordially invited.

Next to President Roosevelt, Secretary Ickes probably commands the interest of more Americans than

any other government official. His responsible position in allotting the tremendous federal funds for public works has made him the target of political opponents, and friends and foes alike will welcome the opportunity of hearing him in person. Charles E. Merriam will introduce Mr. Ickes and conduct a short question period after the secretary's address.
