Dr. Otto Speaks at Lincoln School Here

The speaker for the lecture and study group of the Adult Education classes at Lincoln School last night was Dr. Henry J. Otto of Northwestern University. Dr. Otto explained the progressive movement in education as an effort to suit education to the qualifications of each individual child.

Certain experiments show that it is better for the child to stay with others of his age, though failing to accomplish the necessary grades. Here, the children who were promoted gained more in knowledge at the end of the semester than those who were not promoted, though the studies given were simpler than those occupying the rest of the class, according to Dr. Otto. The failure of some parents to understand the problem, their interference in some cases, has often hindered progress, he said. Co-operation between home, community and school is essential.

Two new language classes started this week at Lincoln School: Intermediate French, Wednesday afternoon, 3:45 p.m. and beginners Spanish, Monday afternoon, 5 p.m.

Membership in the adult education classes is 50 cents a month for those who feel they can pay it, but everyone is welcome. This entitles members to join as many classes as they care to.

The lecture and study group for next Tuesday will have several members give reports on the several educational conferences recently held: first, the conference of the Progressive Education Society held in Cleveland, (department of superintendents of the N.E.A.); second, the county meeting of teachers to be held at Waukegan Saturday morning; and third, the report of the Child Council of Education to be held in Chicago on Saturday.

Prof. M. H. Hunter to Speak Here March 21

The Highland Park League of Women Voters has secured the services of Prof. M. H. Hunter for the next monthly meeting, March 21. Prof. Hunter, who is connected with the department of economics at the University of Illinois, has written a number of books on the subjects of "Corporation Taxation in New York," "The Background of Economics," and "Outlines of Public Finance." He has also contributed articles to a large number of financial periodicals, and is contributing editor to the magazine, "Social Science."

Professor Hunter will speak on "The Referendum on a New Constitutional Convention."

Charles Noll in Race for Probate Judge

Charles Noll, assistant attorney general for the State of Illinois in Lake County, is a candidate for probate judge on the Democratic ticket, subject to the April 10 primaries.

Mr. Noll has been instrumental in having paid into the state treasury more than \$400,000 in inheritance taxes from this county. Next to Cook County, this is the largest amount paid in by any county in the state.

J. E. Rawles, special investigator for Attorney-General Otto Kerner, has praised Mr. Noll's work, and reports that there is still much tax money to be collected in Lake County.

The Illinois Voter Contains Article by Prof. Quincy Wright

The March issue of The Illinois Voter, official organ of the Illinois League of Women Voters, contains an article by the well known Professor Quincy Wright on the "Limits of Economic Nationalism."

Mr. Wright takes exception to the statement of Dean Donham of Harvard who said, "To me, the road to freedom from world wars and to prosperity lies in working out most problems at home." On the contrary, Mr. Wright's belief is that "economic self-sufficiency can be maintained only by arms."

Mr. Wright further discusses the need "for the development of international political machinery, adequate to regulate the amount of internal trade and contact which is inevitable"; the suggestion that the Senate be limited in its capacity to obstruct treaty making; and the proposal that President Roosevelt, be given the power to negotiate reciprocal trade agreements on his own authority.

Mr. Wright concludes that the problem of economic nationalism is "that of continuous alertness to domestic policies which may have international repercussions, measurement of the attitude aroused in foreign states from proposals that do have such repercussions, and modification of policy when such attitudes are of dangerous intensity. Consideration for them should not be regarded as an undignified yielding to threats, but rather a recognition by the state that it is a member of the family nations."
