**Legion Official Is a
Speaker at Meeting
of Highland Park Post**

The 121 members who attended the dinner given last Thursday by Dumaresq Spencer Post of the American Legion, had the opportunity of hearing a stirring talk by Paul W. Armstrong, the senior vice-commander of the department of Illinois.

Mr. Armstrong gave conclusive facts and figures to demonstrate the inadequacy of our national defenses. Although our navy is third in number of ships and men, it is far from being third in fighting strength due to antiquated equipment. And our army is just "something to sneeze at"; 55,000 men comprise our entire combat forces, putting us in 17th place in the armaments of the world. This means that there is but one soldier to guard the welfare of 2,300 inhabitants who can no longer count on the isolation of this country as a safety factor, not with the globe being circled in less time than two weeks, and the United States being spanned from ocean to ocean in half a day! With the world continually decreasing in size, it means that any war is very likely to become a conflict in which all nations will be involved, regardless of any pacific inclinations. Unpreparedness in such an event would be fatal.

The speaker ended his talk by stating the Legion's platform adopted at the national convention at Chicago, which demands a standing army of 165,000 combat troops, a national guard of 210,000, and a navy equal to any.

The Highland Park post announces that A. A. Misegallis, who is more familiarly known as "The Dirt Farmer" from Nebraska, will present to the public his popular subject, "Back to the Constitution," at the Lincoln School Sunday evening, March 18, at 8 o'clock. This is the second in a series of talks on "Americanism" sponsored by the Post, the first having been on "Communism" by Harry A. Jung. These lectures are given in collaboration with the American Vigilante Intelligence Federation.

It is said that Mr. Misegallis presents his subject in such a manner that children sit throughout the evening without any sign of restlessness.

**Meter Readings Are
"Checked and Double
Checked" By Gas Co.**

Records of questions asked by gas company customers during the past year indicate that the possibility of errors being caused by incorrect meter readings has needlessly perturbed a few local residents. For the benefits of others who are not aware of the safeguards that have been instituted, a complete explanation is given, we are told.

In the first place, the men who do this work are chosen for their accuracy and no bill is sent out without first being compared with the previous month's bill. If there is any noticeable discrepancy, either high or low, another man is sent to check the reading of the meter. Curiously enough, the vast majority even of these can be verified as correct. They are simply cases where families' needs for gas differed from the previous month.

Even where an error is too small to be discovered by this method, it is automatically corrected the time the meter is read. This is due to the fact that a gas meter index cannot be changed or reset while it is in service.

Here is how the automatic correction works. Suppose, for instance, that the meter reader accidentally makes the mistake of writing down 50,600 when the meter actually indicates 50,500. Apparently, this would cause a loss amounting to 100 cubic feet. Fortunately, this loss can be only temporary because, at the next time the meter is read, the figure 50,600 must be subtracted from the new reading. Thus, if the customer has actually used 5,000 cubic feet of gas during the month, to give a reading of 55,500, he will only be charged for 4,900 cubic feet and this completes the correction of the error.
