

### Chicago Kennel Club Show Starts March 30

Hundreds of blue-blooded dogs will be shown by well known north and northwest suburban kennel owners at the 33rd annual show of the Chicago Kennel Club, March 30, 31, and April 1 at the First Regiment Armory, 16th and Michigan Avenues, Chicago.

Alexander H. Stewart, of Highland Park, president of the club and famous for his wire-haired fox terriers, predicts the suburban entry will be the largest in years.

Among the leading fanciers who will exhibit strings of dogs, including national and international champions are Thomas M. Howell of Barrington, Irish wolfhounds and Labrador retrievers; Harold M. Florshiem, Highland Park, Irish terriers, including the one that won best of the breed at the recent New York

show; Livingston Osborne, Ravinia, shows; Maurice V. Reynolds, Lake Villa, doberman pinschers; Dr. Noel S. Young, Lake Forest, sealhams; Peter Gregg, River Forest, Great Danes; Aragon Kennels, Franklin Park, Irish setters; and Mrs. W. Harold Cluxton, Glenview, Russian wolfhounds.

Some 40 breeds of dogs, ranging from toy animals weighing a few pounds to huge St. Bernards and Irish wolfhounds, will be shown. The leading kennels of the United States and Canada will be represented. Hundreds of men and women who have pedigreed dogs for pets also will compete for the thousands of dollars in cash prizes, the ribbons and other awards. ### Bird Hikes To Start Again Next Tuesday

Inquiries have been coming into the office of Community Service, Inc. concerning the bird hikes that were so interesting and successful last year. These hikes are again to be resumed.

For the past three years these walks over very interesting country have been very popular, and were attended by individuals of all ages. To be a bird hiker there are two qualifications; a real interest in the out-of-doors and to want to learn more about those interesting neighbors of ours—birds!

The first hike of the season will be held on Tuesday morning, March 20, at 6 o'clock. The leader of these hikes is again to be Bert S. Leech, teacher of natural science at the Elm Place School. Mr. Leech has had many years of experience in this special phase of natural science; and he plans to furnish a form telling about the birds most likely to be seen.

Mr. Leech gives the following instructions concerning these bird summer homes; in fact some of them walks:

"The birds are returning to their are already here. Now is the time for all bird fans to start renewing old friendships.

"An early start is desirable for the beginner because he becomes acquainted with the various species as they arrive, thus avoiding the confusion that arises when field trips are attempted later in the season.

"These field trips will be conducted each Tuesday morning starting at 6 o'clock; weather permitting. Usually we will assemble just west of the field house in Sunset Park.

"Each hiker should provide himself with some kind of bird glass but of course, this is not absolutely necessary. Hiking boots or galoshes however, are very necessary. In the spring there is always plenty of water in most any direction we would care to hike. So to avoid wet feet and possible colds come pre-which are the birds listed most likely.

"You will be given a form upon which to be seen; and birds can be checked as seen.

"The first trip will be held Tuesday, March 20. In case of rain or snow there will be no trip, but unless the weather is very unfavorable there will be a trip each week until the middle of May."

Community Service, Inc., is the sponsor of these interesting trips and invites all who are interested to join Mr. Leech and his bird "gang" next Tuesday morning. There will be no charge for this course in bird study.
