**Young Men's Club Is
Donor of \$555 to
Local Institutions**

A final report of the Highland Park Young Men's Club 1933 charity football team was made by D. S. Boynton, treasurer, last week.

Charity netted a total of \$555.37, two thirds of which, amounting to \$370.25, was forwarded to the Highland Park Hospital Association and the remaining third, amounting to \$185.12, was presented to the athletic fund of the Deerfield-Shields High School.

Gross receipts was approximately \$1800 from which was deducted \$700 for visiting teams and \$555 for expenses, consisting of football equipment, advertising, publicity, medical supplies, etc. In spite of the greater attendance during the 1933 season over the 1932 season, charity netted only approximately \$100 more than 1932. This was mainly due to the lowering of admission prices to the games and the fact that the expenses for visiting teams was three times greater than the previous season.

Local football fans enjoyed a real treat last season in the class of football offered at the local gridiron. Much credit is due to Fred Gilles, football coach, for his devoted interest to the game. Fred, as he is commonly known, is not a resident of Highland Park, but likes his football so well, that he spends two or three evenings a week to and from Chicago during the football season to coach a team. A word of appreciation should also be extended to Dr. S. R. Banfield, local physician, whose medical services have been extended gratuitously and to the entire football staff for making these games possible. Every player gave of his time and services without pay which is highly indicative of the purposes of the Young Men's Club organization.
