The YWCA 23rd annual meeting was held Tuesday, March 27. A luncheon was served by Mrs. Dwight Davis, social chairman. Reports of the work and progress of the year was read by members of the board of directors.

The nominating committee, Mrs. Dwight Davis, Mrs. Clinton Stryker, Mrs. W. A. Alexander, Mrs. R. A. Raff, Mrs. J. B. Garnett and Mrs. E. T. R. Murfey presented the following names for election to serve on the board of directors for a term of three years: Mrs. W. A. Alexander, Miss Adele Everett, Mrs. G. S. Canright, Mrs. J. M. The annual report included the following statistical report: 196 girls were housed for one or more nights; 81 found employment; 157 registered for household employees; 20 outside organizations used the building one or more nights; 80 approximate daily use of house; 4071 year-attendance of grade and high school clubs; 3306 yearly attendance of business, industrial and Mothers' clubs; 399 went on conducted Century of Progress tours in June; 37 registered in foreign born social and educational meeting; 60 registered in contract bridge class; 100 registered in children's theatre; 4 play production classes, 61 in 1st term, 49 in second term; 105 in tap and ballet classes; 70 registered in social dancing class; 15 registered in Mrs. F. C. Peyraud's art class; 25 registered in orchestra and public speaking classes.

Highland Park Boy Is National Rifle Winner

J. A. Butterworth, of Highland Park, has been announced by the National Rifle Association as winner of the national individual collegiate rifle championship.

Mr. Butterworth, a student at the Iowa State College at Ames, Iowa, shot a score of 567x600, which out-ranked a similar score fired by Walter Schmidt, of Washington, D.C. The conditions of the match called for 20 shots each standing, kneeling, and prone at 50 feet with .22 calibre rifles on indoor ranges.

The collegiate individual match is one of the most important of the matches on the winter indoor-range program of competitions conducted by the rifle association, which is the governing body of the sport of rifle shooting. In these matches, competitors of every part of the country shoot their scores on their own ranges under the same conditions and in the presence of authorized witnesses and their targets are scored national headquarters.

Four men armed with shotguns and revolvers took \$365 Tuesday from the Benefit Association of Railroad Employees, at 901 Montrose avenue, Chicago, after terrorizing ten employees.

Gore, Roy Massena, Mrs. Clarence Mead and many others as the outstanding and best fitted candidate in the district.
