

**Basketball Tournament Here Week of April 9**

- 5. Official 1933-34 basketball rules will be used.
- 6. Each team to be composed of not more than ten players.
- 7. No player may play on more than one team in the tournament.
- 8. Drawings will be held in the office of Community Service on the night of April 5, and managers will be notified when and whom they will play.

**Gas Reflects Trends in Living Conditions**

An interesting sidelight on trends in living conditions is contained in a report just completed by the North Shore Gas Company which states that residents of this district were supplied with 1,327,000,000 cubic feet of gas during 1933. Despite a net gain of 10 per cent in the use of gas for house heating during the year, the volume was still 122,000,000 cubic feet below 1932.

When asked to comment on these figures, J. G. Hart, manager of the gas company pointed out, "Our volume depends on the small consumers more than on large users of gas. "During the last four years there was a marked trend towards consolidating small families in order to reduce living expenses. We believe that this trend has almost ceased now but it may be some time before many families get caught up with their finances and are again able to move out into the homes and apartments that they previously occupied. Of course, when the trend turns the other way, our volume will undoubtedly show an increase."
