Navy Pier Is Scene of Preparation For Annual Flower Show

Navy Pier is the scene of great activity this week. Hundreds of workmen from the parks and forest preserves and amateur gardeners from all over the state have been working for days perfecting their entries in the eighth annual garden and flower show which is sponsored by the Garden Club of Illinois. The date of the show is April 7 to 15.

The entire north wing of the Pier has been transformed into a vast fairland of flowers and gardens. Educational and civic projects will be featured in this spectacle.

Mrs. O. W. Dynes, the president of the state federation and general flower show chairman, in speaking of the show said: "We have been working a full year on the Spring Flower Show in Chicago. The schedules were released the first of October and many of the clubs set about making their selections at once. Bulbs were potted, seeds were planted, evergreens and trees were balled and burlaped in October. Lilacs and grape vines were tubed early and Iris was potted in July, August and September according to the varieties used. All of the business of the flower show has been done by volunteer help, members of the board of the Garden Club of Illinois. We are the only organization of garden club women putting on a major flower show. We are trying to give the general public something beautiful and educational. We know that the Chicago Flower Show is recognized as one of the most outstanding if not the finest garden and flower show in the country."

The Bannockburn Garden Club's exhibit will be a wedding banquet breakfast table, planned and arranged by Mrs. Harry T. Wright, Mrs. Harold Brown and Mrs. Arthur Harrison. Deerfield School Elections April 14

Election for two members of the Deerfield-Shields High School Board of Education; for one school director for the Deerfield Grammar School, and two directors for the Wilmot School will be held at three different polling places on Saturday, April 14.

The high school voting will be done in the Town Hall on Deerfield Avenue. Polls will be open from 12 noon until 7 p.m. Edward R. Seese of Bannockburn and E. James Fucik of Highland Park are candidates and no opposition has as yet been announced.

The Deerfield Grammar School polling place is in the gymnasium and will be open from 1 p.m. to 6 p.m. George Engstrom is a candidate for re-election and no opposition has been announced.

Deerfield Village Election April 17

The Wilmot School district is voting for two candidates. Merwin O. Hopkins, whose term expires this year and E. L. Vinyard, who has moved to Highland Park, are the outgoing men. The election will be held at the Wilmot School at 8 p.m. No one has as yet announced his candidacy.

Three village trustees, a clerk, and a police magistrate, will be elected Tuesday, April 17. Polls will be open from 6 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the east and west precincts in Deerfield. There are eleven candidates for the five vacancies.

Candidates for village trustees are Christ Willman, Marshall Pottenger and Ralph Peterson on the People's ticket, two on the New Deal ticket—Charles Scavuzzo and Robert Cole, and one independent candidate—T. G. Johnson. For police magistrate William Johnston on the People's ticket is being opposed by William Bickford.

The greatest contest centers about the office of village clerk with Ralph Horenberger, Chester Wessling and Homer Cazel seeking the election. On a special ballot Deerfield citizens will vote yes for the dry and no for the wet issue of the liquor control question.

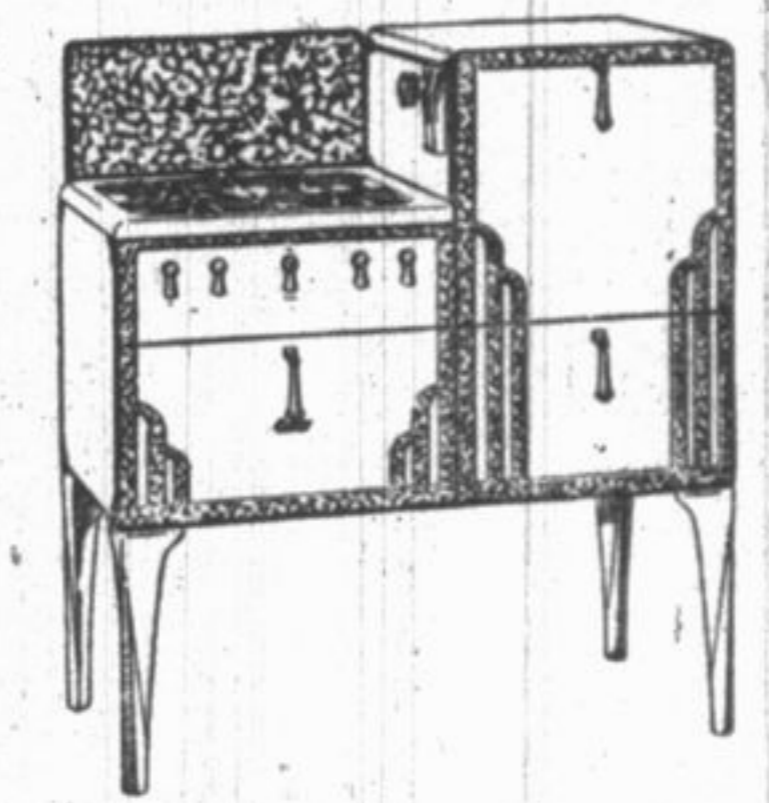
