**THE CHILD LABOR AMENDMENT AND WHAT IT MEANS**

(By E. C. Gordon)

The most vicious, far reaching and socialistic amendment ever proposed to our constitution. The right of the government to control all education is the socialistic bug under the chip.

Only one side of the question has been given great publicity, and before giving the proposition your support it would be well to examine this proposed amendment, and also to see just who are sponsoring it.

The so-called child labor amendment was drafted in 1923. Its author the noted Communist, Mrs. Florence Kelley Wischniewsky. Her collaborators were Miss Julia Lathrop, Grace Abbott and Anna Louise Strong (now Mrs. Shubin of Moscow, Russia), all noted for their red (subversive) activities in this country.

The proposed amendment reads as follows:

"Section 1. The Congress shall have the power to limit, regulate, and prohibit the labor of persons under eighteen years of age."

"Section 2. The power of the several states is unimpaired by this article except that the operation of state laws shall be suspended to the extent necessary to give effect to legislation enacted by the Congress."

There are 45,000,000 persons under 18 years of age in the United States. This first section gives to Congress a full and unlimited power to regulate and prohibit the labor of all these persons.

The legal definition of labor is "physical or mental exertion." This unlimited power "to limit, regulate and prohibit the labor of persons under 18 years of age" could and no doubt would go to control not only the physical exertions of such persons, but their education as well.

The power "to regulate," as interpreted by the Supreme Court in the case of Gibbons vs. Ogden, is this: "The power to regulate implies in its nature full power over the thing to be regulated, and excludes necessarily the action of all others that would perform the same operation on the same thing." Under this unlimited power federal agents could take children from their parents and establish them in colonies as does the Soviet government. Given a definite power, says the Supreme Court, the manner of its exercise is not subject to review by the courts.

Prominent leaders, in both education and politics, all over the country have denounced this amendment.

Dr. Nicholas Murray Butler: "The proposed child labor amendment is precisely the wrong way with which to deal with the problem to which it refers. Moreover it would again attack our government at its foundation by once more enormously extending federal police power to the invasion and destruction of the historic rights of our state and local governments as well as those of the family."

A. Lawrence Lowell, president of Harvard University: "The proposed child labor amendment to the constitution seems to me the worst move that I have ever known taken in this country."

Alfred E. Smith of New York: "I devoutly hope that the people of this country will not permit themselves to be deluded by sentiment, tricked by false logic, coerced by minorities, or stampeded by rhetoric, into a repetition of their recent monumental folly in attempting to legislate morality into the United States Constitution."

Former Senator James A. Reed of Missouri: "It is the greatest step toward centralization ever attempted. It is the most undemocratic proposal ever advanced. It is a march from liberty to despotism. It is not progress; it is retrogression. It assassinates democracy and upon its grave establishes a hybrid monstrosity embracing all the vices and possessing none of the virtues of state socialism and communism."

Congressman Hawes said: "This is a sweeping all-inclusive power; first, to limit the labor of all persons under 18 years of age; second, to regulate the labor of all persons under 18 years of age; and third, to prohibit the labor of all persons under eighteen years of age. It will build up a great national bureau, with thousands of police, called inspectors, who will intrude themselves into the homes, the schools, and the private affairs of the citizens of the states."

If the present policy of robbing the state of their governmental right is continued, they will soon lose their identity, and the general principles that founded and built this republic will be discarded.

It behooves every loyal American citizen to do his utmost to kill this so-called child labor amendment.
